Chateau has prosperous week

Chateau Minor Bantams had a very busy schedule this past week with three league games and one exhibition outing.

Tuesday night saw the Chateaus at home against Milton. After a sluggish start the locals found themselves behind 3-0.

The score stayed that way until Trevor Elinseky put Georgetown on the score board from a pass by Adam Hills. Hills brought the Minor Bantams within one at the 12 minute mark of the third period from passes by Doug Crawford and Mitch Butt. It looked like the score was going to stay 3-2 but with just 31 seconds left and goaltender John Katsilier's on the bench in favour of a sixth attacker, Elinseky popped one in off the pass of Hills to give Georgetown the tie.

"It was a bit different coaching a double A team" said assistant coach Hank Hamilton who was filling in for coach Hartman "The boys were as nervous as I was and it showed on the ice. We'll try and do better in our next game Thursday."

And do better they did.

On the road at Chincoucoussy, the Chateaus vented their frustration on

an unsuspecting Ching team 6-0. Peter Downs again played an outstanding game making several point blank saves to preserve the shutout and break Ching's attack.

Adam Hills and Trevor Elinseky each had two goals and two assists with Mitch Butt and Brad Amato getting the others.

Doug Crawford also picked up three assists in the lopsided affair. "I felt a little more at ease on the bench tonight" said Hamilton "And the boys must have sensed it. They played a terrific game."

Saturday saw the Chateaus back in Alcott to play Burlington with Coach Hartman back behind the bench. They battled to a 6-4 victory. It was a see-saw game from start to finish.

"Johnny kept us in the game," said Hartman "At times our defence let them get some awfully good shots on us." Katsilieris faced 27 shots to Burlington 18.

Scoring for Georgetown were Sean Guistini, Duane Lewis who had two goals on the night and was robbed on his bid for a hat-trick numerous times, Doug Crawford who had the winning goal and Trevor Elinseky

who scored twice including the insurance goal in the last minute.

Sunday, the Chateau Restaurant, Minor Bantams played host to the Grimaby Black Hawks of the Niagara league in an excellent exhibition game. "Grimaby's fast, hard-hitting style forced the team to skate the way I know they are capable of," said Hartman. "We knew this team was fast and the boys would have to play their best to beat them when we invited them here."

The first period was a felling out affair until Chad Hartman scored from Mitch Butt and Duane Lewis at the two minute mark to open the scoring.

Adam Hills scored 30 seconds later from Trevor Elinseky and Duane Lewis with nine seconds left in the first period to put Georgetown ahead 3-0.

In the second period Grimaby threw everything they had at the locals but spectacular goaltending by Downs and strong defence by Adam Hagen, Peter Lee, Brad Amato and Rob Lang made Georgetown's marker the only goal of the period. Sean Guistini scored from a pin point pass by Mark McIn: tyre.

Peter Downs' shutout attempt was foiled in the third period while Georgetown was shorthanded, making the final score 4-1, in a very well played and entertaining game.

"I'm very pleased with the play of the team today," said Hartman. "Our goalies and defence have been playing very well lately and our scoring power is picking up momentum. I hope this carries on into the Whitby Tournament next weekend."

Ski trails prepared

Groomed, track-set cross-country ski trails, located just minutes from Toronto, will again be open this winter in Metro region conservation areas.

The trails can be found at Albion Hills, Bruce's Mill, and Palgrave Conservation Areas, and the Kor-tright Centre for Conservation. Improvements have been made to the trails at Albion Hills, including the construction of new bridges and the addition of five kilometres of new trails. All trails are open when weather permits - for ski conditions, call (416) 661-6600.

Trail fees at all locations are \$4.50 for adults, \$1 for children 15 years of age and under, and \$10 for a family day pass. Season passes are \$30 for adults, \$6 for children.

Special events are scheduled this winter, including the Chinguacousy Challenge Ski Race on Saturday, Jan. 23, at Albion Hills. Free cross-country ski lessons will be offered on Sunday, Jan. 24, and Saturday, Jan. 30, at Albion Hills and Bruce's Mill.

Domtar peewees edged out

A "goals for" and "goals against" formula denied the Georgetown Domtar "AA" Minor Pee Wees and opportunity to move on to the finals of the 13th annual early bird Pee Wee "AA" tournament held in St. Thomas last week-end.

Playing their finest hockey of the season the Domtar Packagers opened the tourney Friday night with an exciting 3-1 victory over the Kitchener Crusaders.

Georgetown got on the board early when Derek Parsons took a set up from Ryan Pirie and Todd Fuller and fired a 20 footer under the crossbar after only 19 seconds.

Paul Kalbarski scored what proved to be the winning goal three minutes into the second period assisted by Steve Boyle.

With only one second remaining on the clock in the second period Kitchener narrowed the margin to 2-1 scoring from a scramble in front of goalie Trevor Knight.

The third period proved to be very exciting as the action went end to end. Neither side was able to

capitalize until the final minute when Jimmy Kavanagh scored an unassisted empty net goal to ice the victory for Georgetown.

Early Saturday morning Georgetown took to the ice for their second game of the tournament against Woodbridge Raiders. The two teams battled to a 2-2 tie after two periods of play, however Georgetown broke it open in the third scoring four unanswered goals to win going away 6-2.

Fuller and Parsons each scored a pair with single tallies going to Boyle and Matt Pickett.

Kalbarski assisted on three goals, while Kavanagh had two assists along with Keith Montgomery. Single helpers went to Parsons, Fuller, Pirie, and Ryan Brann.

Mississauga Terriers who also won their first two games were the next opponent for Georgetown. The winner was guaranteed a berth in the championship round, the loser would have to wait for the results of other games to determine whether or not they would get to the "final four."

Again Georgetown got off to a good start when Jason Walker scored in the second minute of play from Boyle and Kalbarski.

Unfortunately for Georgetown that was to be their only goal. Mississauga tied it before the period ended and they scored two goals in each of the next two periods to win 5-1. Penalties hurt Georgetown as they took eight of the 14 penalties, six of them in the last two periods.

Georgetown's destiny was not to be decided until the completion of the London-Sarnia game, three hours later.

A London win would assure the local kids of "championship play" the following day. A tie or victory by Sarnia would put Georgetown out and Sarnia would qualify.

A goal with less than three minutes to play gave Sarnia the 4-4 tie they needed and because of a better "goal for" and "against" average knocked Georgetown out of the championship round even though the two teams were tied with four points each.

Royals split weekend outings
