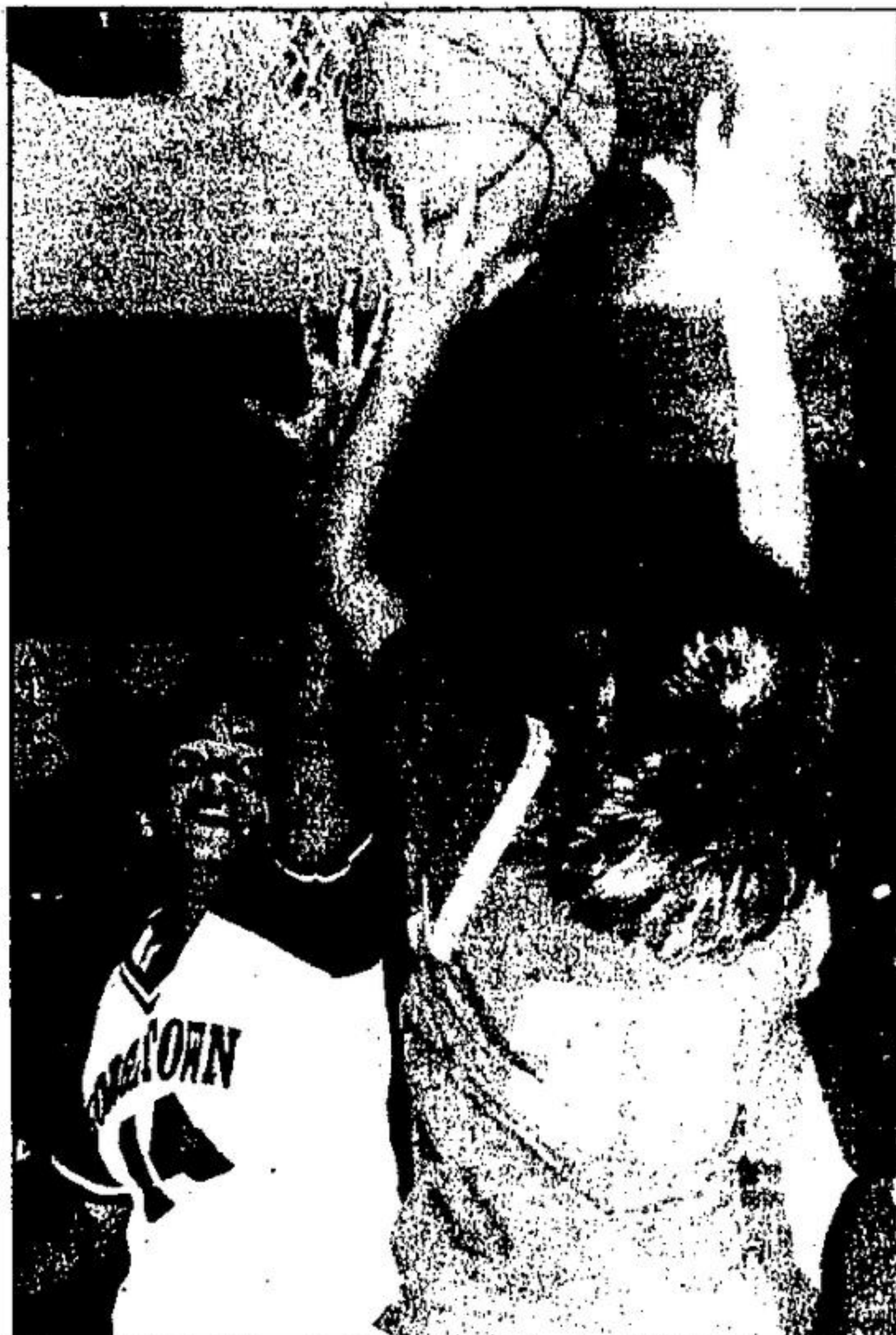

Johnson atoms suffer two close setbacks
