## Job centre 50 Plus can't raise funding

A centre aiding older Georgetown residents to find jobs closed its doors Tuesday after failing to match provincial funding.

50 Plus, located in Oakville's Hopedale Mall, was one of about 16 similar centres in the province designed to help unemployed workers over 50 years of age get back into the workforce.

In its six months of operation, the centre helped about 254 older unemployed workers find jobs, including about four people from the Georgetown area, says centre director Derek Hanney.

He says the centre was about \$15,000 short of the \$40,000 needed to fulfill its contact obligations with the Ministry of Skills Development.

The centres board of directors was unable to raise enough money from the private and corporate sector to match the government's contribution, says Hanney.

He says local businesses didn't have enough time to establish its credibility.

Hanney doesn't blame the Ministry for the centre's demise, because it lived up to its obligation to provide funding on a matching-grant basis. But he says the government should recognize the difficulties centres such as Fifty Plus have in gaining public recognition.

The government should provide centres such as 50 Plus with full funding for the first year of operation, about 70 per cent for the second year and 50 per cent for the third year, Hanney suggested.

MPP Cam Jackson (Burlington-South) criticized the Ministry of Skills Development handling of 50 Plus. Employment help centres, such as 50 Plus, shouldn't be forced to close while other less successful employment programs continue to receive funding, he told MPPs in the legislature Monday.

Skills Development Minister Alvin Curling responded that he might have been able to prevent the centres closing had he been informed in advance of the problem.

He added, however, that he was willing to have his officials examine the centres problem to see if it is feasible to help it reopen.

In the meantime, Hanney says the centre's clients will be referred to the Canada Employment Centre and he too will be out of work.

"It's kind of sad," Hanney said, as the centre's only remaining staff members packed office files into boxes. "I've got to look for work."
