Proactive program prevents crimes in holiday season

During the festive season celebrations and merrymaking are on most people's minds.
Unfortunately, along with all that merrymaking there is something else that is traditionally on the upswing around the Christmas season - crime.

District 1 of the Halton Regional Police Force is trying to stop Christmas crime increase this year by implementing a "proactive" program to stop the common Christmas crimes. Drinking and driving, shoplifting and fraud are consistently on the increase in December, said Staff Sergeant Richard Kivell, of the Georgetown headquarters.

This year the local police will be increasing their spot checks but they are also making a positive step towards heading off shoplifting and fraud before they occur this festive season, Sgt. Kivell said.

District 1 has stopped over 7,500 cars up to the end of October this year in Halton Hills and Milton, said Staff Inspector Roy Taylor.

There are four platoons in District 1 and each platoon has 13 officers. Platoon 1 has managed to stop over 1,000 cars a month since the summer, Sgt. Kivell said. The original goal for Platoon 1 was to stop only 100 cars a month, he said.

He expects his own platoon will stop about 1,500 cars in the month of December.

"The public should know that we are always out there," he said. The well established RIDE (Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere) program used by Toronto Metro police is in effect in Halton all year round, said Sgt. Kivell. It just gets stepped up a bit

around Christmas.
Each platoon has its own goal, said Sgt. Kivell. They all increase spot checks. "I'll stop an awful lot of cars," he said.

In an effort to cut down on fraud, particularly fraudulent cheques, and shoplifting this Christmas police hope to visit every merchant in Halton Hills and Milton to personally talk to the owners and managers and hand out pamphlets advising how to curb the problem, said Sgt. Kivell.

Generally, the police find out how bad the problem is each year after all the reports come in after Christmas, he said.

The problems usually centre around the hustling and bustling of the Christmas season, said Staff Inspector Taylor. Retailers who are often hurried during the month of December, may not take all the precautions they would take at other times, he said.

The main thing is not to be hurried, the pamphlets say. It's important to evaluate each and every cheque. Some people spend more money than they should at Christmas, said Inspector Taylor.
