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Team seeks support

A "first class" hockey team from Sweden is coming to Acton Dec. 29 to take on a local side.

The Tingsyrd select team is visiting Southern Ontario at the request of Flamboro and Acton has taken advantage of the invitation to host the squad in the Dec. 29 match-up.

Acton Minor Hockey Association Secretary Mark Holmes appeared before Town Council Dec. 14 to request a \$300 grant to offset the costs of hosting the team.

The event will cost the Acton Minor Hockey Association about \$1,000, said Mr. Holmes.

"It's a rare event, especially for Acton," he said.

The Acton Hockey Association is responsible for paying part of the Swedish team's transportation costs, said Mr. Holmes.

There will be a reception following the game and some of the money may be used to purchase a memento

of the occasion, said Mr. Holmes.

Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson recalled the Georgetown Minor Hockey Association made a similar request a few years ago for a visiting Swedish team.

Recreation Director Tom Shepard said the Town had contributed to the Association on that occasion.

But Treasurer Ray King said there is no more money left in the Town's Grant coffers.

He said there will be money left over from other accounts, however.

"Will it be worth the drive that day to go to Acton?" quizzed Coun. Al Cook.

"Most certainly," replied Mr. Holmes.

"It is worth the drive to Acton whether there is a game going on up there, or not," said Coun. Elliott.

The Town voted to give the Association funds to a maximum of \$300.
