**Curwood negotiations at standstill: union**

Negotiations between workers at Curwood Packaging in Georgetown and management are at a standstill.

The two sides met with mediator Jack Berger Dec. 21 but "nothing happened," said Graphic Arts Communications Union Local 500 President Mike Zajac.

"The company never moved at all from their last position," said Mr. Zajac.

The 115 workers at Curwood supported a strike vote Dec. 10 after turning down an offer by the company.

The Union is asking for more money, higher shift premiums, no continental work week and better benefits including vacation time, said Mr. Zajac.

"These people haven't had a real

wage increase in two years," said Mr. Zajac.

He accused the firm of trying to import ideas from its U.S. parent, Bemis Chemical Corporation.

Low shift premiums and specific language of the contract in the area of management rights are two ideas which don't go down well in Canada, said Mr. Zajac.

"We're not going to dance to their tune," he said.

Curwood President Barry Kedwell was not available for comment on the stalled meetings.

The union is negotiating its first contract since gaining certification at Curwood in April.

The two sides have been bargaining since mid-June.

**Mayor tells Chamber about town expansion**

The Georgetown Chamber of Commerce Christmas luncheon Dec. 15 gave the mayor an opportunity to discuss business with members.

Mayor Russ Miller supplied a model of the new municipal complex to the Chamber members. He predicted the complex would be completed in 12 to 14 months at a cost of \$6.5 million. The mayor said the property surrounding the 37,000 square foot complex would be developed for future housing.

Mayor Miller predicted the eventual construction of 4,000 homes south of Georgetown. The homes would be built to eventually service a population of 40,000 in Georgetown. The construction of the first 200 homes is slated for the spring of 1988, he said.

To meet the demands of the increased population, Russ Miller discussed the development of four school sites, a new firehall, four acres of residential and commercial land, 20 acres of parkland and

a site for a high-rise apartment.

Mayor Miller said 375 acres of land will be for industrial purposes. For recreation, 300 acres of valley will be used to build a golf course. The stipulation, mentioned the mayor, is that the course be built within 10 years or the town may purchase the land back for \$50,000.

**Police beat**

**Slippery road**

A 16-year-old Georgetown man was charged following an accident on a slippery surface on Winston Churchill Boulevard at Noble Street at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 20. The man was driving his 1980 Pontiac southbound on Winston Churchill Boulevard at 60 kilometres per hour when he lost control of his vehicle on the slippery surface. The car skidded off the road and struck a tree on the west side of the road. Damage to the car was listed at \$6,000.

**Horse killed**

A horse was killed after it was struck by a car on the Tenth Line at Clayhill Road at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 18. A 49-year-old Georgetown man was driving his 1988 Chevrolet northbound on the Tenth Line when it collided with a horse which was crossing the highway.

Another 1988 Chevrolet was following the car and it struck the rear of the first car. Charges of impaired driving and following too close were laid in the accident. Damage to the leading car was \$200 and damage to the second car was \$3,000.

**3 car crash**

A three-car collision caused over \$4,000 damage at 2 p.m. on Guelph St. at Mountainview Road Dec. 18. Two vehicles, a 1986 Ford and a 1985 AMC slowed down and stopped for traffic as they travelled westbound on Guelph Street.

A third vehicle, a 1975 Oldsmobile driven by a 26-year-old Acton man, struck the AMC sending it into the Ford. Damage to the Oldsmobile was \$2,000, damage to the AMC was \$2,000 and damage to the Ford is \$200. Charges of following too close were laid in the accident.
