Tournaments not their forte, but...

M and M cruises along in Tri-County

The M and M Pro Sport Bantams are faring well in Tri-County hockey action, but not so well in tournament play.

In the Ottawa International Tournament held over the Christmas break, Georgetown met some very physical teams and came home empty-handed, as far as points go.

In their first encounter, they lost 4-1 to West Island, a team from Montreal, with their lone goal scored by Craig Cooper from Jim English.

The second game saw the locals come out on the short end of a 7-3 game with Nepean. Goal scorers were Dave Watts, Chad Bailey and English. Credited with assists were Watts, Mark Mininch, Bill McDonald and Trent Cull.

The third game of the tournament pitted the M and M crew against South Nation with the result an 8-1 drubbing. The lone goal was by Watts, from Cull and Wade Serjeantson. Although they were beaten by goals, they never gave up, and coaches Keith Bennett and Lefebvre were very happy with the team's effort.

Their next tournament appearance was in Aurora, and the team knew full well that they were in for a real battle. The tournament

ly had an opening in the AAA side, but that didn't matter.

Mississauga Black Hawks was their first opponent. Eric Long, who once played for the Hawks, got things started with a goal from Rod Pasma and Dale McNiven. The Black Hawks took the lead late in the third period but with just 40 seconds to go Cooper got the equalizer from Long. The tournament committee gave the star of the game to a Hawks player but most agreed it should have gone to goalie Chris Cambouris.

Welland took the next game, in a penalty filled contest, 4-2. Georgetown's two goals coming late in the third frame by McNiven and Rich Bond. Bond drew an assist as did Pasma, Gord Burke and goalie Paul St. Pierre.

With a "win, we're in" attitude, Pro sports took on Kingston. Kingston drew first blood late in the second period. They increased their lead early in the third, but the locals came back a minute and a half later when English found the mark, unassisted. Kingston pulled ahead 3-1 with just over five minutes remaining, but Pasma drew the game closer 23 seconds later. Kingston went out 3-2.

Returning to Tri-County play no

one would have guessed this was the same team that had them talking in Aurora.

Orangeville put the scare into Georgetown by scoring three goals in the third period but M and M held on to pull out a 4-3 win. English scored a natural hat trick and Burke had the other goal. Chad Bailey led the assist parade by notching three with singles going to Craig Cooper, Trent Cull and Burke.

The only team in Tri-County that Georgetown has not beat all season is Dundas, and the game on Jan. 14 was no exception, ending in a 4-1 loss.

Dundas took an early 2-0 lead before Burke, from Serjeantson, registered a reply. Dundas drew two more goals in the second frame. The third period featured end-to-end action with the only penalties being recorded, in what was a very good game.

Oakville was in town on Saturday to try their luck, and lucky they were, as they went home with a 5-5 tie. The tying goal was recorded with no time remaining on the clock. Dale McNiven scored twice for Georgetown, while Chad Bailey, Eric Long and Mark Mininch counted singles. Long had two assists as did Rich Bond and Ser-

jeantson. Burke, English, McDonald, and Cull got single assists.

Victory Number 17 of the season came from Streetsville on Sunday. In a early morning practice the locals spent considerable time working on their powerplay and it paid off. Eight times to be exact, as they easily defeated Streetsville 10-0 with goalie Chris Cambouris recording the shutout and collecting two assists. Gord Burke and Jim English tied in points by scoring two goals and four assists each. Kevin Usher counted his first hattrick and Bill McDonald got three points on one goal and two helpers. Wade Serjeantson chipped in with three assists. Single goals went to Eric Long and Rod Pasma. Captain Dale McNiven helped on two goals. Rich Bond, Chad Bailey and Trent Cull also notched one point each on assists. Streetsville tallied 49 minutes in penalties to Georgetown's 18.

The M and M Pro Sport Bantams will end their regular season play this weekend when they take on Flamboro at the Carlisle Arena on Saturday night and return home to play Burlington on Sunday at 2:30 at the Alcott Arena.

Johnson and Associates suffer two setbacks

The Johnson and Associates Major B Atomus lost to Milton by a score of 6-0 last Saturday, and Sunday dropped a 6-1 exhibition decision to the Thornhill Rebels.

Milton opened the scoring in the first period Saturday with a controversial goal. Goaltender Sean Mills had apparently smothered the puck by the left goalpost, with a Milton player poking at it. But after a delay, the referee decided that it was a goal. A few minutes later, Mills scored the second goal. The third period saw Milton score two goals in the last three minutes to round out the final.

Morris and Scott Wilson broke up two-on-ones, and Mills stopped two breakaways. Offensively, Stephen Yurichuk, Matt Lush, Wilson and Katsilieris provided most of the scoring threat.

Sunday, a poor third period proved to be Georgetown's undoing, as they lost to Thornhill.

The two teams played the first period to a scoreless draw. Both teams had four shots on goal, and Georgetown actually put the puck in the net, but the referee disallowed it. Defencemen Jim Katsilieris and Andrew Elinesky led the offence, and Shannon Morris blocked two shots to lead the defence.
