Jobs were scarce, but he found one with Canadlan Westinghouse in Hamilton as a two-year apprentice at \$90 a month. In 1926 he found a job with Canadian National Telegraphs.


Toronto. The following year he joined their newly formed engineering department where he was given charge of the automatic and associated equipment over the en-tire CN system. He held this position

until he retired in January, 1963. March 29, 1927 he married Dora Jamieson in Toronto and they had two children, Margaret (Mrs. C.R. Parks), now living in Kapuskasing, Ontario, and Ross of Georgetown. Dora passed away in 1963 after a marriage of 56 years.

In 1940 he joined the Canadian Army. He did not see active service overseas this time and retired with the rank of major in 1947.

He has calculated that they flew a total of 128,304 air miles and visited 32 politicallyindependent countries,

Mr. Coller has six grandchildren James, Douglas and John Colter, Janice Nicoll, and Kathy and John Parks. He also has three great-grandchildren, Matthew, Stephen and Kaitlyn Colter, His hobby now is reading which he does extensively.



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
