## Georgetown ladies diffuse Rockets

A dramatic goal with just 29 seconds left in the game, gave the Georgetown Women's Hockey Team a well-deserved 1-0 victory over Oro Sunday night at Memorial Arena, in Dufferin-Peel Ladies hockey action.

Prior to Sunday's contest, the Georgetown team had been struggling, dropping a 2-0 decision on home ice to Newmarket on Jan. 14, and suffering a 2-1 setback in Nobleton Saturday.

Georgetown is trying to stay out of the basement in the league standings, and Sunday's victory will go a long way towards turning things around, with four regular schedule games remaining.

Georgetown was hoping to match their strong effort of the previous week, when they hosted Newmarket last Sunday, but things didn't go as planned.

The locals got off to a slow start, and failed to click with their passes throughout the contest.

The teams played a scoreless first period, although Georgetown had a good scoring opportunity, only to have a player miss the open net.

Newmarket capitalized with a pair of goals in a second period, which proved to be all the scoring they would need.

Georgetown dropped their second consecutive game Saturday, when they visited Nobleton.

Neither team could score in the opening frame, but Nobleton took the lead with a powerplay marker midway through the second. Georgetown came back with a powerplay marker of their own, a short time later, as Pam Anderson scored from Lisa Allen.

Goalie Joan Osborne did a good job of keeping the puck out of the net for Georgetown with several key saves.

But the third period proved fatal for the locals, as Nobleton scored to break the deadlock, and Georgetown lost the services of Monika Mastalerz, to a knee injury.

stellar goaltending from Osborne as they played cat-and-mouse with the visiting Oro Rockets.

Osborne was called upon to make a number of saves throughout the contest to keep Oro off the board.

Lisa Allen had a chance to settle the issue with a few minutes remaining in the contest when she was sent

in on a breakaway. But her shot was wide, and the game remained scoreless.

The game seemed destined to end in a tie, until Georgetown got the break they were waiting for. Catching the Rockets on a line change, Michelle Richmond broke in on the left wing untouched. Her initial shot

was stopped by the Oro netminder, but Richmond pounced on the rebound and tucked it in with just 29 seconds showing on the clock, for the only goal of the contest.

Georgetown's next home game is this Sunday, when they entertain Caledon at Memorial Arena, beginning at 9 p.m.

## Major atoms finish with strong showing

The North Halton Sports Major Atom "AA" hockey team took three of a possible four points last week and showed signs that they are rounding into top form for the playoffs.

The Major Atoms travelled to Burlington on Saturday and skated to a 4-4 tie with the home side. David Bouskill, Gavin Glaser, Blaine McCauley and Duane Erier scored single goals for the Georgetown side. Doug Sheppard chipped in with three assists, while Bouskill, Erier, McCauley and Tyson Hackett each added a helper. Strong goaltending was provided by Chad Hughes and John Waller.

On Sunday, Oakville travelled to Memorial Arena to be hosted by the North Halton Sports team in the season's final regular schedule game.

In a chippy contest, that saw the visitors display nothing of what is

good about minor hockey, our Major Atoms skated to a 6-2 victory. Defenceman Hackett keyed the offence for Georgetown as he notched two goals.

Single markers were scored by Glaser, Bouskill, Cory Evans and Stephen Onoprijenko. McCauley earned two assists, with single helpers recorded by Erier, Onoprijenko, Giannis Markou, Tom Dembia and Jamie Stephenson. Hughes and Waller again were very effective in backstopping the victory.

The North Halton Sports team, with a third place finish in Tri-County League play, now take on Streetsville in OMHA playdown action.

Coaches Chris Milne and Dan Curtis are optimistic that the Major Atoms will assert themselves very well in the playoffs.

## Johnson atoms avenge defeats

The Johnson and Associates Major B Atoms avenged three previous losses to Ancaster, with a well-deserved 3-2 victory, last Wednesday in Ancaster.

The whole team put in a solid defensive performance, and the newly-formed line of Craig Blair, Scott Wilson, and Jaimie Bottomley provided much of the offence.

Ancaster opened the scoring at 5:43 of the first period, on a two-on-two. The Georgetown goaltender went down to block the initial shot, but the defence failed to cover the other Ancaster player, who flipped the puck over the fallen goalie, for the score. And at 3:38, Ancaster potted another, and it looked like it would be a long night for the locals.

But just 16 seconds later,

Georgetown replied. The puck came back to Jim Katsilieris at the right point. His high, hard shot was blocked, but the rebound came to Blair in the slot, who got the puck to Wilson, by the side of the net. He made no mistake, and suddenly the Johnson team was back in the game.

The second period was a tightly-played affair, with each team having only one good scoring chance each, and each failing to capitalize on it.

The third period started off on the right foot for the locals, when at 9:46 Wilson registered another goal. Blair picked up the puck from Katsilieris, circled behind the Ancaster net, and slid a goalmouth pass to Wilson. This revitalized Georgetown. With about four

minutes to go, Wilson set up Blair in the slot, but the shot went just wide. Seth Homer, who shared goaltending with Sean Mills, then made the save of the game, using his facemask to stop a point-blank shot, and then another the rebound as well.

With only 1:04 left in the game, Ancaster was assessed an interference penalty, to set the stage for the upset. Coaches Barry Mills and George Wilson sent out a powerplay unit consisting of Wilson, Blair, Matt Lush, Andrew Elinesky and Shannon Morris. The puck went into the Ancaster end. Wilson set up Blair in the slot, but the puck ricocheted into the corner. Lush dug it out to Wilson, who had parked himself in front of

the net and he drove it home. Final score was 3-2.

This game had several points of note. First, the team played a strong game defensively. Ancaster had only one one-on-one and one two-on-one opportunity, and was held to only five good scoring chances overall. The goaltending of Mills and Homer was solid. Evan Craighhead, Morris and Lush blocked shots. And the wingers were back-checking. Secondly, Georgetown stayed out of the penalty box, denying Ancaster the use of their powerplay. (This has the ancillary benefit of qualifying the team for the Esso penalty-free Sweepstakes).
