Playoff preview

Outmanned, Gems make a go of it

Anyone who came late to the Oakville-Georgetown Junior B hockey game Saturday at the Alcott Arena, may have had a hard time sorting out who the winning team

The final score showed the visiting Blades on top by a 9-6 margin, but the Gemini locker room didn't, in any way, resemble a hangout for

"The guys showed a lot of team spirit," said Gemini assistant coach Jim Storr, who was at the helm Saturday night. "They showed some good stuff. We proved we're in better shape physically than they (the Blades) are."

Georgetown coach Peter Sturgeon wasn't behind the bench for the game Saturday. Instead, he took a perch high in the stands, so he could better analyze the Oakville team, who will probably be the Gems' first

playoff opponent. Things couldn't have looked much worse for the Gems. Already riddled with assorted injuries, matters became critical at the end of the first period, when a mild skirmish broke out in the Georgetown end of the rink.

The fracus didn't amount to much more than a let of shoving, but when the teams failed to return to neutral ice, the referee began tossing bodies.

A total of four Oakville players, and three from the Gems were sent to early showers, further depleting the Georgetown ranks.

When they came out in the second, the Gems had only three extra skaters on the bench, while the Blades, with a full squad, barely noticed the loss of four of their players.

"There were no complaints about ice time," chuckled Storr following the game. "We found out what they're made of. Everybody gave a hundred per cent."

The Georgetown plight, was helped somewhat when defendeman Mark Pries donned the equipment and took to the ice, despite an injured

elbow. Chuck Loreto was deservedly named the Player of the Game for the Gems, after putting on a tremendous performance that netted him

two goals and an assist. Shannon Storr opened the scoring in the game to give the Gems a 1-0 lead before Tony Deluca, Cole Secf, and Simon Thompson struck for

The teams exchanged a pair of goals each in the third period, as Brad Demone and Chris McEachern tallied for the Blades.

Loreto scored his second of the night for the Gems when he jammed in a rebound at 1:36, and Kevin Dance went top shelf with a shot in the final few minutes to round out

the scoring. The game Saturday marked the first start by goaltender Charlie Potvin in a Georgetown uniform, after he was released by the Richmond Hill Dynes several weeks ago, Potvin made a number of excellent saves, particularly in the second period, when Oakville applied some heavy pressure.

He faced 41 Oakville shots in the game, while Gauthier faced 32 Georgetown shots.

Friday the Gems were in Burlington, where they dropped a 9-5 decision to the Cougars. But the loss was more costly than simply in the standings. Team captain Jim Mc-Cabe broke his wrist in the contest, and has been sidelined for what will likely be the remainder of the season.

Dance had three goals and an assist in the game, while Loreto and Brazeau each had a goal and two assists.

Bill Kovacs led the Cougars with three goals, while Paul Constantin added a pair.
