Chateau sweeps Oakville

The Georgetown Chateau Restaurant Minor Bantams, after losing a late-season bid for second place, met Oakville in the first round of OMHA qualifying playoffs, and swept a best-of-three series. In Game One, Georgetown hosted Oakville at the Alcott Arena Friday. The Chateau squad came on strong in the first few minutes of the contest, as Mark McIntyre scored from Duane Lewis and Brad Amato after only 18 seconds had elapsed. Just 55 seconds later, Georgetown tallied again with a goal by Amato from Sean Gustini. Their lead stood up until early in the second period, when Oakville scored the first of two quick goals to tie the score 2-2. Georgetown regained their lead with a goal four minutes and 23 seconds into the period, as Chad Hartman scored from Mitch Butt and Doug Crawford. But again, Georgetown was unable to hold on to the lead, as Oakville netted two quick goals in the late stages of the period. The Chateau Bantams forced the

game into overtime with a goal by Lewis, assisted by line mates Gustini, and centre Adam Hills, in the third period. Georgetown dominated the overtime period, with strong defence and a potent offensive attack. Hills, Gustini, and Hartman all scored to round out the 7-4 victory for Georgetown. Lewis, Hills and Gustini were all credited with assists in the overtime scoring. Georgetown travelled to Oakville for the second game of the set, and came away with a 7-2 win to wrap up the series in two straight games. Oakville opened the scoring early with a marker just 24 seconds into the opening period. The Chateau squad wasn't long regrouping, however, and Lewis slipped in a loose puck just 13 seconds later, with Gustini and McIntyre picking up assists. Oakville regained the lead temporarily with a goal late in the period, but Georgetown dominated the rest of the way, both offensively and defensively, with six unanswered goals. Finding the mark for the Chateau team were Hills, Crawford, Amato, Hartman, Trevor

Klinesky, and Adam Hagen. Klinesky also chipped in with four assists to help the Georgetown cause, while Hills and McIntyre had two apiece, and singles went to Gustini, Hagen, Amato, and Brad Tutt. The victory was also due in large part to the physical contributions made by Tutt, Mitch Butt, and Peter Lee. Coaches Gary Hartman and Hank Hamilton were pleased with the team's sweep of the determined Oakville squad, and are eagerly awaiting their next playoff showdown, which will be against Milton.
