brown furry mutt is comparable to toboggans and ski equipment in the Elmer the Safety Elephant and garage in the winter. Smokey the Bear, said Const.

"McGruff is an easily recognizable figur that we can use to get our crime prevention message across to the children", he said.

During his visit to Grade 4, 5 and 6 classrooms, children flock to McGruff whom they recognize from television.

The shaggy dog is only new to the Halton police department, Const. George said. Children are familiar with him from cartoons.

He showed children a film presentation explaining ways the youngsters could assist the police and themselves with crime proofing

The measures could include locking up their bicycles and skateboards in the summer to insure they are not stolen and putting their mual basis," he said.

The message the police depart-ment wants to get across is, "crime

prevention is something not only for the police department . . . Everyone
