Watters to speak at Heritage dinner

The name Bill Watters is well known in hockey circles, and has become even more so in the last few days.

To begin with, Watters has negotiated more hockey contracts as a

player agent, than anyone in the business today.

And as if that weren't enough, Watters' name has been bandied about the last few days as a possible successor to the fired Gerry McNamara as general manager of the Toronto Maple Leafs.

At any rate, Watters isn't likely to be at a loss for words when he takes the podium as guest speaker for the 11th Annual Georgetown Hockey

Heritage Council Dinner, on March 7.

Watters first began his fulltime association with hockey in 1970, when he was appointed the director of the Bobby Orr-Mike Walton Sports Camp. Around that time, he became in-

volved in player management affairs, negotiating his first contract following the 1975 NHL draft. Since then, the professional hockey contracts he has negotiated

have included over 60 first round selections. Watters was also extremely active

in the international hockey scene for a time. In addition to being business manager of the first Canada Cup championship team in 1976, he also served as coordinator for the Junior World Tournament, hosted by Canada in December of 1977.

Watters was appointed General Manager of Team Canada for 1977-78-79, upon Canada's re-entry into World Ice Hockey Championships competition, and twice was asked to assemble the NHL's entry for Moscow's Izvestia Tournament.

Being an acknowledged expert in the game of hockey, Watters has become a popular media figure.

In addition to being a regular panelist on The Sports Network's weekly feature, The Sports Page, Watters has served as color analyst for both the 1986 Memorial Cup Playoffs, and, more recently, radio broadcasts of Toronto Maple Leafs games.

Master of ceremonles for the Hockey Heritage Dinner will be Ron. MacLean, of Hockey Night in Canada.

During the course of the evening, Walter (Red) Asseltine will be honored as this year's recipient of the Georgetown Hockey Heritage Award, for his contribution to hockey in Georgetown.

Winning goal scored at buzzer

Gems' loss easier to take

Herald Sports Editor Joe Washkurak scored once, and assisted on two other Georgetown Gemini goals to set a new club scoring record, but it wasn't enough as the Gems dropped a 6-5 decision to visiting Mimico Monarchs at the Alcott Arena Friday night.

The three points he picked up gave Washkurak an even 100 on the season according to club stats, and eclipsed the mark of 97 points set by Wayne Morrow just last season. Washkurak finished with 43 goals

and 57 assists. The record was tied on Thursday night in Barrie, when Washkurak scored the lone goal in a 9-1 loss to the Colts.

And at the 8:03 mark of the game Friday, he picked up an assist on a powerplay goal by Adam Bennett to set a new mark.

The fact that the Gems lost to the Monarchs in their final regular schegule game in the Central Ontario Jr. B loop, was virtually lost amid the excitement.

It didn't appear the players were too put out anyway, despite giving up a goal with no time on the clock to hand the Monarchs the win.

"I think everybody was concentrating on helping Joey," said Georgetown coach Peter Sturgeon following the game. "We had the game in the bag, and just let down for 10 minutes in the third."

But Sturgeon doesn't plan to take the loss too much to heart, and doubted the players would either. There are more important mat-

ters to dwell on. "The guys are looking forward to getting into the playoffs. Since that game with Oakville (on Jan. 30) they've been looking ahead to getting at them again."

"That game" was a 9-6 loss to the Blades. But despite losing, the Gems put on a good show with an extremely short staff on hand.

The Gemini and the Blades were to open their best-of-seven quarterfinal series in Oakville last night (Tuesday), and the second game is set to go this Thursday at the Alcott Arena at 7:30 p.m.

Mimico took a 2-1 lead after the

The Gems got that one back with Bennett's powerplay goal at 8:03, set up by Greg Brazeau and Washkurak, with his assist to set the record.

Washkurak's 100th point came at the 6:16 mark, with the Gems enjoying a man advantage. Don Cruise shovelled a pass across to Washkurak at the point, and he let go a blast that was redirected into

the net by Presswood, making it 5-3. The Gems appeared to be well in control of the game until the final

few minutes. The Monarchs took advantage of a powerplay opportunity at 13:28, when Remo Tucci took a pass behind the Georgetown net and circled around to beat Gemini goalie Todd King on the long side.

Mimico tied the game with exactly one minute left when James scored. It seemed everyone was figuring on the game ending in a tie, when Dayal scooped up a loose puck on his side of the blueline, and went in alone on King. Dayal put a move on the goaltender and slipped the puck

by him just as the buzzer sounded. The Gems put up a half-hearted objection, claiming the puck went over the line after time had elapsed, but the goal stood, going down officially as being scored at 19:59.

Defeated as they were, though, the Georgetown players at least didn't have to go hungry.

Prior to the game, club president Dave Kentner vowed to give Washkurak "pizza money" for him

and his team mates, if he broke the record during the game. A hasty collection was taken up from executive members to honor

Discrepancy found in statistics

A discrepancy seems to have arisen as to whether or not Joe Washkurak of the Georgetown Gemini has reached the 100-point plateau for the 1987-88 season.

According to statistics kept locally by the Jr. B hockey club, Washkurak had 96 points heading into the final two games of the regular schedule.

On Thursday, in Barrie, he picked up a goal, and Friday against Mimico, he had a goal and two

assists, which should give him an even 100 points on the season.

But according to statistics kept by the league, Washkurak only had 33 points heading into the game with Barrie, and the four points he registered in the two games last week would give him a total of 97. Paul Wilkinson, statistician for

Sabres take two-game lead

The Acton Sabres won a 10-7 shootout on home Ice Friday, to take a 2-0 lead in their best-of-seven Mid-Ontario Jr. C Hockey League playoff series with the Caledon Flyers.

After the victory Friday, and a 5-3 win in the series opener at Caledon, the Sabres appear to be well in control of matters. But Acton general manager Jules Russiani isn't exactly jumping up and down.

"We're not playing playoff hockey," Russiani says. "We're allowing too many goals for playoff hockey.

If there's one bright spot in what Russiani has seen so far in the series, it's the play of nelminder Tom Hill, who was between the pipes for both wins.

Russiani contends it was sloppy work in their end of the rink that allowed Caledon to score seven times on Hill, and in no way reflected on the goaltender's efforts.

"Tommy let a couple of cheap ones in," Russiani says. "But he made some saves that kept us in the game, too. If it hadn't been for him the results of the two games could easily have been reversed."

Hill has been forced to stop a number of close-in shots from the slot, and came up big to foil a couple of breakaway attempts Friday.
