The Bradford Bulls took a 2-1 lead in their best-of-seven set against Schomberg. The Bulls took decisions of 8-4 and 7-4, before losing the third game 4-3.

The three teams to survive the preliminary series, will do battle in a double round robin series, and the top two teams will then advance to face off for the league title.
