Since then, she acts as if the conversation never happened. She sometimes limps and always has bruises. But when I ask about them, she says she's accident-prone and took another tumble.

Why on earth would a woman stay with an abusive husband like that? Is there anything I can do? - CON-CERNED, SAG HARBOR, N.Y.

DEAR CONCERNED - Most wives stick it out because they are too ashamed or terrified to take action. They often suffer from low self-es-

teem. Like your neighbor, they come to believe the abuse is their fault and if they just behaved, it would stop. Or they have nowhere to go.

Tragically, many don't seek help until they see their children threatened or hurt. You might try to talk to your neighbor about that danger, and help her call the shelter or accompany her there. The professionals there

will give her advice and support. DEAR MEG - My husband wants me to get my face lifted. We've been married 30 years, and he never criticized my looks. Now he's so hyped on the subject he's threatening to walk out if I don't get a face lift.

A genuine love relationship is best built between two unattached people. My guess is, this man sees you as available and wants to make the most of it. Beware.

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


