

### Impaired

A Georgetown woman will appear in court March 14 on impaired driving charges. The 30-year-old was stopped Feb. 14 at 3:30 a.m. when she made a U-turn at Maple Avenue and Trafalgar Road to avoid the spot check she saw ahead of her.

### Erratic driver

A 42-year-old observed driving in an erratic manner Feb. 13 at 1:40 a.m. will appear in court on impaired driving charges Feb. 29. The East Garafraxa County man was stopped at Guelph Street and Maple Avenue.

## Open Door expanding, funds offer stability

The past year was a very momentous one for Open Door, chairman John Carter told board members at the drop-in centre's first annual meeting.

During 1987 the Open Door became an entity unto itself, separate from St. George's Church and received its patent as a corporation Sept. 17, 1987 when it registered with the Ontario government.

Speaking to the group of 12 assembled at St. George's Saturday morning, Mr. Carter explained some of the centre's past events.

Open Door developed plans to expand from a two to a five day a week operation and to initiate a teen mother's program.

As well, Mr. Carter said discussions, which began with the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services (COMSOC) in July, culminated in January 1988 with its agreement to fund the charity \$8,100 annually.

COMSOC is also willing to provide \$6,800 in the January to March 1988 period to buy needed equipment and furniture for Open Door and to assist in the centre's operating expenses, Mr. Carter said.

Open Door, a drop-in centre for teenagers, was the inspiration of St. George's Church rector Jim Boyles in 1983. It first opened its doors in 1984 as an extension of St. George's before it became separate in 1987.

Bev Scruton, counsellor at Open



Door, gave a programming report explaining how the program operated on a two-day-a-week basis throughout the school terms with occasional Friday night activities.

Open Door students also participated in special events, she said, such as in January 1987 they hosted a Youth Nuclear Disarmament Tour with the help of Georgetown District High School student council members.

In November of 1987 Open Door set up a display for parents night at the high school and a month later organized a Christmas party for students, their families and board members.

In order to raise funds for the organization Open Door students participated in events such as a car wash and golf tournament in June and held a concert in the park in August.

Mary Lou Olah, who presented the publicity report, was pleased with how the community is viewing Open Door.

"Open Door is now not seen negatively but positively," she said.

The image being presented to the community of these youngsters is

positive, Mrs. Olah said, and the people are impressed with the teenagers who help out at fund-raising events.

In her treasurer's report Jan Costain told board members Open Door completed the year with a small surplus.

Another encouraging aspect of the financial year, she said, was that more churches, individuals and businesses made donations to the charity. One of the goals of the centre was to increase its level of incoming donations.

For the year-ending, December 1987, Open Door received \$25,000 in revenue from the Anglican in Mission Funding, Region of Halton, local church donations, fund-raising events and other sources while in 1986 the charity received \$21,965.

Expenditures for the year-ending, December 1987, were \$24,725 with a surplus of \$1,365 while in 1986 expenditures were \$24,404 with a surplus of \$561.

John Carter was re-elected chairman of Open Door, Cathy Oomen was elected secretary and George Olah treasurer.
