M and M Bantams beat by Brampton in OMHA quarterfinal playoff series

The M and M Pro Sports Bantam hockey team's quest for an Ontario Minor Hockey Association title was halted recently, as they were swept three games straight in a best-offive quarterfinal playoff series with Brampton.

The M and M squad advanced to the showdown with Brampton by first eliminating Burlington in a best-of-three match-up, with a 4-2 victory in the deciding game of the

Burlington took advantage of a two-man advantage to score the first goal of the game late in the opening period.

But in the second, it was all Georgetown as Jim English triggered the attack, scoring twice in a nine-second span. Chad Bailey and Dale McNiven drew assists on both tallies.

Georgetown was all over Burlington throughout the period, but were unable to add to their 2-1 lead until late in the third, when McNiven scored from Craig Cooper and English.

With just over a minute remaining in regulation time, Burlington pulled their goalie in favor of an extra attacker, and the move paid off as they scored to close the Georgetown lead to 3-2.

Burlington continued to press with their man advantage, in hopes of tying the game. But Mark Mininch picked up the puck in the Georgetown end, and slipped It

manned It to Wade Serjeantson at centre ice. Serjeantson broke in on the empty net and scored with just six seconds left, despite having a Burlington player's stick tossed

across the ice to hinder him. Moving into the quarterfinals, Georgetown was awarded the home ice advantage, due to their superior standing in league play over Brampton, by one point.

Brampton held a distinct edge in play between the two teams during the season, as M and M could only manage one win in their meetings.

With just over five minutes remaining in the opening game's first period, Bill McDonald put the locals on the scoreboard with a goal from Rich Bond and Pasma. However, Brampton replied to tie the game with a minute and a half left in the period.

Georgetown regained the lead in the second with a goal by Serjeantson from McDonald and Mininch, and another by Dave Watts from Pasma, just 16 seconds apart to

make it 3-1. But Brampton fought back to tle It again with a pair of goals in the final four minutes of the period.

The only scoring play of the third belonged to Brampton, and they held on for the 4-3 victory to take the onegame lead in the series. Only 10 minutes in penalties were

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1988 BRINGS TWO **IMPORTANT** CHANGES TO THE ONTARIO FARM TAX REBATE **PROGRAM**

CHANGE NUMBER ONE:

The Ontario Farm Tax Rebate program now makes two payments a year to farmers and farm property owners, compared to one annual payment previously.

CHANGE NUMBER TWO:

Those eligible for the program will receive two forms to complete—one in the spring and the second one in early fall. Each must be completed and returned to obtain each payment.

Completing the first form will generate a payment of approximately 50% of the total 1988 rebate based on the previous year's eligible tax levy.

Completing the second form will result in a second payment for the balance of the property owners' 1988 rebate and will be based on the owners' actual 1988 eligible tax levy.

WHAT STAYS THE SAME

The Ontario Farm Tax Rebate program is designed to ease the tax burden faced by farmers.

Farmers are not required to pre-pay a portion of their municipal taxes to qualify for the rebate.

100% of municipal taxes on eligible farm land and outbuildings may be rebated.

No rebate will be paid for taxes levied on farm residences and one acre of land. There will be no reassessment of farm properties unless changes to the property that would normally require reassessment




