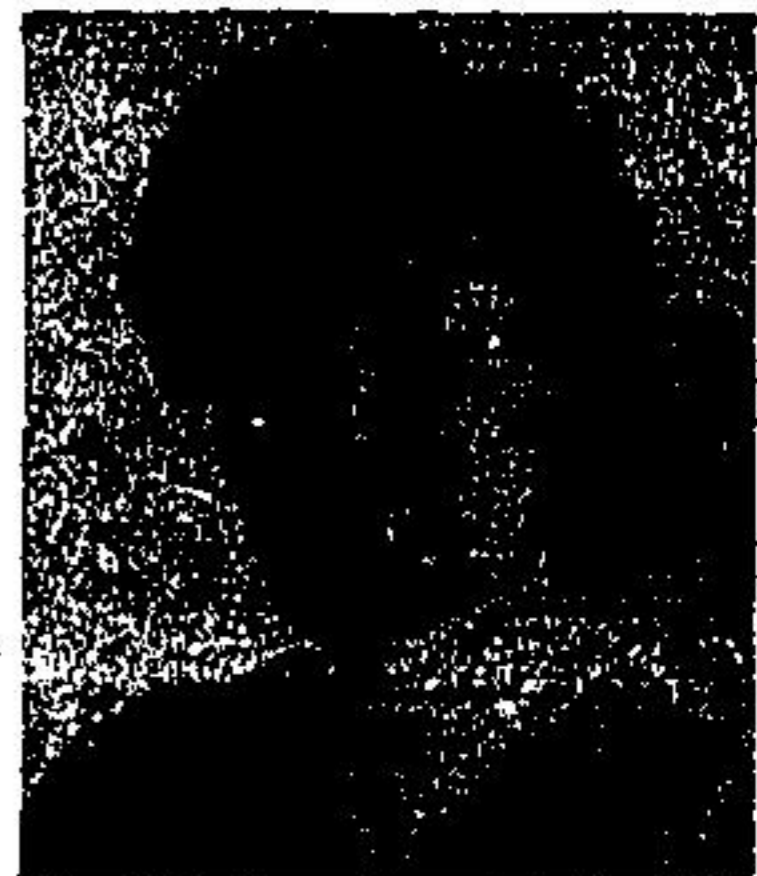
The store features retail camera
