"We decided we hated selling pine furniture," Mrs. Hampton said. Eventually the clothing aspect of the business took over with the pine furniture becoming backdrops.

When she started out, Mrs. Hampton had no retail experience save for being a good consumer.

"We did it as we went along," she said. The owners realized that success does not come overnight but they just kept hanging in there.

"It is really very exciting," Mrs. Hampton said. What with the clothing styles changing four times a year with the seasons there is always something new.

The Village Shoppe sells mainly cosual wear such as skirts, jackets, pants and blouses adding the extra dashes such as scaris, hoisery and jewellery.

"It is lovely sending a customer out of the store all done," Mrs. Hampton said.

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
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## Customers are supportive
