Host Kingston Thursday night

Juveniles advance to semis

The Georgetown Gemini Juveniles doubled up on Streetsville 8-4 Friday night at the Alcott Arena, to sweep their best-of-five OMHA quarterfinal playoff series in three straight

games. The series win moved the Georgetown squad a step closer to the OMHA crown, as they prepare to open at home to Kingston on Thursday night in a semifinal showdown.

Against Streetsville, the Georgetown squad played well enough to win, after taking earlier

But coach Charlle Hanman expects things to get a little tougher from here on in.

"We seemed to go through the series fairly easily," he says. "We were never really extended at anvtime."

Streetsville showed up for Friday's game with only four extra skaters, and Hanman says their coach never made any of the games in the series, apparently due to other commitments.

Looking ahead to Kingston, Han-

man doesn't know exactly what to expect. Kingston swept Richmond Hill in their quarterfinal series. "It's hard to get information on teams that way," Hanman says, "We knew Richmond Hill was weak, because we had no problem with them at a tournament in Ajex earlier. "We don't really know what

Kingston will have. But they must be half decent to get this far."

Thursday's opener in the series is scheduled to start at 8:30 p.m. at the Alcott Arena. The second and third games of the set will be in Kingston during the March 19 weekend.

Friday, Streetsville opened the scoring with a goal early in the first period.

The lead held up until the final few minutes of the period, when Georgetown scored three quick goals to move into a 3-1 lead.

The locals extended their lead to 5-2 after the second, and then scored three goals to Streetsville's two markers to take the 8-4 win. Terry Dixon and Rory Kennedy

paced the Georgetown attack with two goals and two assists each. Pat McCarthy with a pair, and Chris Marling and Mark Hiller with singles rounded out the Georgetown

Steve Turner chipped in with three assists, while Marling, Dean Morgan, and Dennis Doucette had a pair of assists each, and McCarthy added one assist.

In the opening game of the series, Georgetown received solid goaltending from John Lantz en route to their 6-1 victory.

The defensive corps of Bill Herman, Morgan, Doucette, Turner, and McCarthy put together a strong curtain to support Lantz's play.

In the second game of the set, Georgetown jumped out to a quick 3-0 lead, and then relied on steady goaltending by Joe Balson until the final frame when they rounded out the 6-3 win.

Kennedy led the scoring attack with three goals, while single markers went to Doucette, Dan

Kent, and Rob Cooper.

Dixon contributed to the cause with four assists, while Turner and Kent had two each, and Kennedy added a lone assist.

Even though the organizers were still hammering out some of the "specifics" late last week, the 28th Annual Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament is set to get under way this Saturday at the Alcott Arena.

Among those "specifics" were the number of teams that will be competing, and who those teams will be. But tournament chairman Wayne Pries wasn't worried.

"Some of the teams that were coming, have advanced to the next round of the playoffs," Pries said Thursday. "So we're just trying to finalize the teams. But it always seems to come down to the last week. A few years ago, we filled the last hole on the Saturday morning, the day the tournament started. So we're not pushing the panic button
