Regina Mundi College of London held on for a 3-2 win over Sacred Heart High School of Newmarket, to claim the championship title in the Bishop Reding Invitational Junior Hockey Tournament held in Milton Friday.

A total of 12 teams took part in the tournament, which is expected to become an annual event.

The teams were divided into four divisions for round robin play, with the winners in each, advancing to the semifinals.

In their division, the Regina Mundi Titans had a relatively easy time, defeating Ascension of Our Lord, Mississauga 10-2, and the host Bishop Reding Royals 11-2, to advance.

Phillip Pocock Catholic High School of Mississauga won their division with wins of 9-0 over St. Mary's of Woodstock, and 6-1 over Guelph's Our Lady of Lourdes.

In the other divisions, it was Sacred Heart and Loyola of Oakville, who advanced to the semifinals.

Sacred Heart edged Assumption of Burlington 3-1, and then shaded Jacob Hespeler of Cambridge 6-5. Loyola won their division by downing Father Michael Goetz of Mississauga 2-0, and then doubling St. David's of Waterloo 6-3, to set up the semifinal confrontation.

Sacred Heart earned a berth in the championship with a 4-3 win over Loyola.

The other semi-final had to be shortened considerably after a freak occurrence. With Pocock leading 2-1 over Regina Mundi, and 15 minutes remaining in the final period, a section of glass was knocked out along the boards. It was impossible to replace the glass, so it was decided the teams would go into a shootout to decide the matter.

The Titans managed to tie the game and then won it with their seventh shooter, as the final score read 5-4.

That set the stage for the championship game, which was won by Regina Mundi 3-2 over Sacred Heart.

Brian Arseneault, who along with Bruce Mazer, helped organize the tournament, was pleased with the way things ran, and felt it was appropriate that the teams travelling the farthest for the tournament should meet in the championship game.

The Titans were presented with the tournament's championship trophy, and will have their name inscribed as the first on the larger trophy that will remain at Bishop Reding.

In the first game played in Georgetown the home team had little trouble defeating their opponent 15-3, as Orangeville could only ice six skaters and two goaltenders in this lopsided affair.

Racking up the points for Georgetown were Dale McNiven (5 goals, 1 assist); Jim English and Bill McDonald (3-3 each); Dave Watts and Rich Bond (2-2); Chad Bailey and Craig Cooper (1-3); Rod Pasma (2 assists); and Eric Long, Kevin Usher and Trevor Elineksy (1 assist).

Game 2 in Orangeville had the home teams coming up with 11 skaters and two goaltenders. They played a better game but still came out on the short end of a 7-3 score. Bill McDonald led the way with two goals and two assists, while Craig Cooper had one goal and two assists, and Wade Serjantson and Dave Watts had a goal and an assist each, as did Rod Pasma. Rich Bond had two assists and Jim English collected one goal, while Chad Bailey got a helper and even goaltender Paul St. Pierre was given credit with an assist.

The next series was against Burlington, with the first game being played in Georgetown on Saturday.

Burlington wanted to avenge the loss they took in OMHA playdowns to the M and M crew. In that series Georgetown took the first game 4-3 in overtime, lost the second 3-1 and took the final 4-2.

Burlington played a very physical first and second periods which helped them to take a 3-0 lead into the third. Persistence and luck finally caught up to the home team in the third when Craig Cooper broke the shutout with the help of Bill

McDonald at 10:27. Five minutes and fifteen seconds later Dave Watts found the mark again with the help of McDonald. Jim English unloaded a bullet to the top corner to bring the locals even at three apiece, Dave McNiven and Chad Bailey were given assists.

The game then went into overtime after much discussion and protest by the Burlington coaching staff.

McDonald broke the tie at 8:45 from Rich Bond, McNiven counted a goal from Bailey and English at 5:27, and at 3:56 English got another from Bailey and Kevin Usher.

Rich Bond's unassisted effort made it seven straight goals for the M and M crew before Burlington ended their count at four, with just one second left.

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Johnson atoms fall behind in series

The Johnson and Associates Major B Atoms are off to a struggling start in their Tri County Harrison Division, double round robin playoffs.

Playing in Burlington last Tuesday (March 1), it was proved once again that 20 minutes of good play does not make a good hockey game, as the locals dropped an 8-1 decision to the Data Generals.

Meeting on Saturday, in their first meeting of the series with Oakville, the Johnson squad was blanked 6-0 on home ice.

The first period of the Burlington contest was punctuated by four defensive errors that led directly to four goals for the Generals.

Twice in a one-minute span, the locals' defencemen tried to play the man instead of the puck, got deked,

and couldn't recover in time to break up the scoring play.

The Generals' third goal came on a shot from an impossible angle, from behind the net. The fourth marker came on a breakaway, after a Georgetown defenceman hit an oncoming Burlington player with the puck, and he went in to score at the buzzer, making it 4-0.

The second period was a complete turnaround from the opening frame. The locals outshot Burlington, and played them even-up in a fast-paced period, with lots of on-the-fly line changes.

The best scoring chance for Georgetown came when Jim Katsileris took a hard shot from the slot that missed the post by inches.

The two teams continued to play

evenly through the first 10 minutes of the 15-minute third period. During this time, Burlington added two goals to their total, and Georgetown finally found the scoresheet.

The Johnson marker came on a nice solo effort by Craig Blair, who picked up a loose puck, beat a couple of defenders, and placed a good, low shot under the goalie's glove hand.

Burlington added two more goals in the final minute of play to round out the 8-1 final.

Saturday, Oakville opened the scoring at the seven-minute mark of the first period, with a shot through the goaltender's legs. Just past the eight-minute mark, they made it 2-0, scoring from a goalmouth scramble, while enjoying a man advantage.

Their third goal came after a giveaway in the Georgetown end. The initial shot went wide, but the rebound came off the boards and an Oakville player put it in from in front of the net to make it 3-0, after the first.

Georgetown played its best hockey defensively in the second. Oakville was held to only two good scoring chances, a one-on-one, and a breakaway. Unfortunately, they capitalized on both chances to make it 5-0.

Katsileris and Andrew Elineksy had blocked shots in the period.

The final period was a wide open affair, with Oakville outshooting the locals 17-6, and scoring the only goal.

Goalie Sean Mills made several good saves, while Shannon Morris broke up two-on-one and three-on-one rushes by Oakville. Elineksy had another blocked shot.

Stephen Yurichuk and Wesley Byrke enjoyed the best scoring opportunities for Georgetown, but were unable to cash in.

The next game for Johnson and Associates squad is Friday at 7:30 p.m., when they entertain Burlington for a return match at the Alcott Arena.
