Who says it's not cricket?

Sport of artistic rhythm returns to town

The sound of "Willow against the leather" beckons once more to the cricket fields.

After a break of one year due to the absence of a playing field, the Georgetown Cricket Club starts another season in the Hamilton and District League this May.

The team will be playing on the field of Stewarttown Public School which was dug up last summer for laying new septic beds and tanks.

The great writer-novelist George Bernard Shaw once described cricket as "a game played by 22 fools and watched by 22,000 other fools." However, for sheer artistic

grace, skill and poetic rhythm cricket is the king of all games.

This is the game from which baseball evolved and gained popularity in North America and Canada.

Cricket is just as popular as baseball is in Canada; in overseas countries like Australia, England, India, New Zealand, Pakistan and West Indies. It is a gentleman's game of glorious chance. The ups and downs in cricket can be compared to people's lives. This what makes cricket a great character builder. It teaches a cricketer to be humble in victory and gracious in defeat.

Racquet Club looks to up memberships, sweeping changes

In a plan to make it more appealing to a broader range of potential members, the Georgetown Racquet Club will be implementing a few major changes over the next few months.

But rather than cosmetic, these changes will be in the administration of the club.

"We want to make the club appeal to a broader section of the population," says club president Graham Tyler. "The club is healthy, financially, but we feel this is the best way to continue its vitality. If we don't bring new members in, the club could stagnate."

The most prominent change at the Racquet Club will be the accessibility. Memberships will be opened up to the general public.

To this point, the club has operated with about 200 members, who paid to have a share in the club when they took out their membership. Playing privileges were tied to ownership.

Presently, there are only two types of membership available, single and family.

Under the new system there would be more ways people could enjoy playing privileges at the club.

"We'll be including a number of types of memberships, such as introductory, trial, and off-peak-period memberships," Tyler says. "With the flexibility of member-

ships, it will be easier to have people join, and it will protect the equity of people in the club now."

Taking out a membership before has meant a fairly healthy outlay financially, but with the new system, a membership would be somewhere between 50 and 75 per cent of current costs. Annual fees would essentially remain the same, and there would be an initiation fee, but the over all cost would be lessened since the new member would not have to buy a "membership unit".

Original share members would retain all voting privileges, as far as the administration of the club is concerned.

The Georgetown Racquet Club features a total of four squash courts, two North American and two International, as well as two outdoor fully-lit tennis courts. There are no additional court fees for members when they are used, as long as they have been booked previously.

Tyler says the club is ironing out the fine points of the new membership system, and there are a number of steps to go through, due to government regulations on corporations.

He expects they will have the framework of the system prepared by the end of April. Over the summer, the memberships will be defined, and it will be determined how the new set-up will operate.

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Local team impressive in Master-Bantam bowling competition

Kerry Wright won the high-triple flat trophy with Lisa Lane taking the high single over average with a plus-68.

David Leslie rounded out the successful day by also getting the high single over average with a plus-71.

Master Andy Parent will now be taking his charges to the Provincial Final on April 9 in Brantford.
