DEAR MEG - My france was best man at my brother's wedding. There were a lot of parties before the wedding, and, of course, Jack and I were invited to them. But there were two


parties Jack didn't take me to. His excuse was that they were "bachelorparties" and women weren't included. But a friend told me later that there were women at both parties - women nobody knew.

Declarer ruffed the opening lead, drew trumps ending in dummy and took a heart finesse. After winning the heart queen, West realized that three club tricks were needed to set the contract. He therefore led the club queen, playing East for the A-J of clubs. Down one.


The contract can be assured after the opening lead if declarer makes the right avoidance plays. First let him throw a heart from dummy at trick one. East will win his diamond ace and presumably return a heart. Declarer wins the ace, draws the defenders' trumps and then plays the king and 10 of hearts. When West comes up with the queen, declarer can ruff and return to his hand with a spade to shed a club from dummy on the fourth heart. Even if West plays a low heart on the 10, South can play a club from dummy. Should East then win the heart queen, he will not be able to attack the club king in dummy, and declarer will make 10 tricks by getting rid of another low club in dummy on his fourth beart.

In search of entries

When South won the first trick with happens so often that it's almost a his heart queen, he suspected that he needed to grab nine tricks right away. So he played to dummy's queen of spades and took a diamond finesse. When West showed out, declarer needed an extra entry to dummy to pick up the diamond suit without a loser. He played another spade and put in the 10. When that held, he was home free. He played a diamond to his nine and a spade back to dummy's ace. A third diamond lead from dummy enabled declarer to make five diamond tricks and his contract.

As the band was played, West could have thwarted South's plans by putting up the jack of spades on the second lead of that suit. The ace wins the trick, but the extra entry to dummy disappears.

Of course any declarer wishing to be enshrined in the bridge columnists' hall of fame will simply play the spade king at trick two and overtake with dummy's ace. Now, when a diamond to the jack discloses the bad split, de-, clarer is able to finesse the spade 10 in dummy to gain an extra entry, and West is helpless to prevent it. That might not even be the right play, since it gives up an overtrick when the diamonds split normally (4-0 splits are fairly rare), but it makes for an interesting bridge story.


