

Bad roads

Bad road conditions caused a 7:20 p.m. accident March 21 on Trafalgar Road and sent four people to hospital. Kevin Burton, 20, of Georgetown, and Nathan Crawford, 20, of Georgetown, are in satisfactory condition in the Georgetown and District Hospital. Otmir Eller, 57, of Oshawa, and Olga Eller, 55, of Oshawa, were treated and released from hospital. A 1985 blue Chevrolet, driven by a 57-year-old Oshawa man, was northbound on Trafalgar Road. A 1981 beige Dodge, driven by a 20-year-old Georgetown man, was southbound on Trafalgar Road. The Chevrolet lost control on the icy road and slid into the southbound lane. The Dodge struck the Chevrolet in the right side.

Sent to hospital

Two Toronto residents were sent to hospital following a 7:44 p.m. accident March 17 on Guelph Street and Maple Avenue. Mary Amorosa, 35, of Toronto, and Julie Amorosa, who is under a year old, of Toronto, were treated and released from the Georgetown and District Hospital. A 1983 black Toyota, driven by a 23-year-old Limehouse man, was eastbound on Guelph Street attempting a left hand turn. The driver did not see a 1983 grey Chevrolet, driven by a 36-year-old Toronto woman, as another car was obstructing the view. The cars collided in the westbound lane of Guelph Street coming to rest on a traffic island against a traffic signal. Both vehicles were proceeding on a green light. A charge of failing to yield the right of way was laid.

Speeds too fast

NOTICE OF THE PASSAGE OF A BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills has enacted By-law 88-18 to designate the "Williams Mill" and "Georgetown Electric Light Company Power Plant" at 515 Main Street, Glen Williams, on property described as Part of Village Lot 63, Plan 49 (south of Main Street) and Part of the West Half of Lot 21, Concession 10, as being of architectural and historic interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

"THE WILLIAMS HALL"

The structure is of heavy timber construction with mortice and tenon framing. The foundation walls are coursed rubble with timber framing having a clapboard cladding. The windows are 6 over 6 double hung.

The building is one of the oldest remaining mills in Glen Williams. It was the site of Benajah Williams original saw mill erected in 1826 and has been in continuous use as a saw mill, hosiery, and apple processing factory.

"GEORGETOWN ELECTRIC LIGHT COMPANY POWER PLANT"

This stone structure has large 5 foot by 8 foot casement windows employing single piece stone lintels and sills, and remains exist of an iron penstock and raceway.

The building was the site of the Williams Flour Mill. The present building was constructed as an electric power generating plant, and was the first local building constructed specifically for the purpose of generating electricity for sale to the public.

8 townhomes denied

A local developer has been denied permission to build an eight unit townhouse on Lots 38 and 39 on Park Avenue in Georgetown.

Gail Brearley of Millview Residential Developments wanted to put an eight unit townhouse on the property but zoning restrictions limited the units to six.

The town's Committee of Adjustment refused to lift the zoning regulations to allow the two extra units because it "does not meet the intent and purpose of the official plan."

The committee said the application is not a minor variance.

Millview solicitor Bert Arnold argued that the Georgetown Downtown Core area policy labels the land for re-development for higher density uses such as the Silver Creek Tower.

Mr. Arnold also argued that the appropriate zoning bylaw on the property actually allows a seven storey

apartment building on the property and the proposed townhouse units are not as built up as that.

However two Georgetown residents, David Williams of Park Avenue and John Cable of 48 Park Avenue objected to the eight unit townhouses.

Mr. Williams worried that his property might lose its current zoning for a future apartment site.

Mr. Cable said he wouldn't object to a six unit townhouse but he felt eight units is "pushing to the ultimate."
