Brunch, music, to remember Ralph's dream

Herald Special Ralph Ursel was a man with a dream. A dream that would wed the community in which he lived to the musical arts which be so loved.

Although Ralph never lived to see the fulfillment of his dream, his inspiration and enthusiasm ignited the creative passions of those with whom he shared it, and other continued on with the torch, transforming the chryselis of his idea into a viable reality.

May 1, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in the cultural centre gallery, Halton Hills is invited to savor a slice of Raiph Ursel's dream. Arts Alive '85, the week-long festival of the arts being held at the Cultural Centre, is commencing their scheduled activities with "Remembering Ralph -A Classical Brunch", in tribute to Ralph Ursel, whose impressive list of accomplishments includes cofounding the Georgetown Choral Society, founding the original Globe Productions and Halton Hills Arts Council, being instrumental in erecting the Halton Hills Cultural Centre, running Summerfest for a number of years, and obtaining the title of Lions Club Citizen of the Year for his community involvement. He was a popular planist and entertainer in local circles, and also taught music and science at Georgetown District High School.

In 1986, Festival Five held their first classical brunch in honor of Ralph's dream, and it was such an astounding success that it was decided to repeat the event for Arts Alive

The brunch this year offers the same delectable menu as the one entoyed at Festival Five (i.e. quiche, luice, rolls, salad and fruit), but the entertainment is new. Featured this year is barp/flute duo "Divertimento". The name may sound somewhat like an Italian opera to the uninformed, but it is actually a "musical term referring to a composition for small instrumental ensemble, written primarily for entertainment, and thus usually rather light in style." In this case, Divertimento also refers to two musically gifted ladies: Marianne Carefoot, flutist, and Sandra Fann, harpist.

Marianne Carefoot is a freelance flutist and teacher who graduated from the University of Alberta with a Bachelor of Music, and has since resided in Toronto. She has performed with the Ningara Symphony Orchestra, Edmonton Symphony, Courtenay Festival Orchestra, and as principal flute with the Etobicoke Philharmonic.

She has performed on CBC and has appeared as soloist with the Etobicoke Philharmonic and Courtenay Festival Orchestras. Marianne Carefoot includes Robert Altken and Marcel Moyse among her teachers. She has been teaching, flute to students of all ages since 1973, both privately and at Upper Canada College, Havergal College, as well as for the North York and Scarborough Boards of Education.

Sandra Fann, freelance harpist, is active both as a solo entertainer and as part of Divertimento. Her concert

career includes performances with the National Ballet Orchestra and the Kingston Symphony, and numerous concerts in the Toronto

area, including for the American

Harp Society - Canadian Branch, the Pauline McGlbbon Centre, bunnybrook and Oakville Hospitals,

school concerts for the Toronto Board of Education, the Bau-xi Art Gallery, and for the Toronto Musiclans' Association Annual Dinner and See the Music Festival. Broadcast performances include a taping for national CBC television and inconcert recording for the Australian Broadcasting Commission.

Sandra Fann holds a Bachelor of Music from the University of Illinois, where she studied with Charles Kleinsteuber. She studied with Carlos Salzedo at the Summer Harp Colony of America in Camden Maine, at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Alice Chalifoux, and with Judy Loman of the Toronto Symphony.

Sandra Fann is renowned for her sensitive interpretations of a very wide and varied repertoire, "From Back to Led Zeppelin", which she developed during four years as soloist in the Greenery Lounge of the Plaza II Hotel and four years at the Delta Mississauga Inn. These two talented ladies pooled

their expertise in 1985 to form "Divertimento". With a repertoire chosen for its wide audience appeal, they have been in steady demand for corporate and private occasions. The due has performed in a diversity of settings - from the intimacy of the Old Mill Wedding Chapel to the grandeur of the Royal York's Imperial Room, from poolside birthday parties to penthouse holiday season. dinners, from wedding celebrations in the gardens of historic McLean House to black tie corporate celebrations at the Four Seasons Hotel. Their carefully selected repertoire

spans a wide range of classical, jam, pop, and traditional folk music, inchiding Bach, Mozart, Puccini and Debussy; Hoagy Carmichael, Gershwin and Carlos Jobim; Streisand, Paul Simon and the Beatles. Arrangements can be made for special requests, and music selected for each appearance is a balance of classical and/or non-classical music to suit the ambiance of each occasion.

The duo frequently provides musical accompaniment for special occasions in private bomes as well as churches. 
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
