Ruth Thompson led the group in some cheery Irish songs. Muriel Nurse gave the motto "Immigrants have played an important role in the building of this country, making it more civilized and dynamic. The program was prepared by the convenor, Waverly Halst.

forefathers, four or five generations back." Most came from the British Isles with France and Spain also mentioned.
