**McDermid could run in Halton-Peel**

The only MP to sit as a Member of Parliament for Brampton-Georgetown could be the first MP to represent Halton-Peel.

At the inaugural meeting of the Progressive Conservative Association for Halton-Peel, Mr. McDermid didn't rule out running as a candidate in this area.

Earlier, Mr. McDermid had said he would probably choose a Brampton riding in the next federal election.

The MP for the third largest riding in Canada said he was "seriously

considering all three ridings (two in Brampton, and one which includes Halton Hills). I want to keep you in suspense for a little while longer," he added.

In an interview afterwards, Mr. McDermid said he wanted to leave his decision about where to run in the next election open for the time being.

"I'm thinking it over carefully," he said.

The MP, who has served Georgetown residents since 1979, said he will make a decision by May 1.

There is obvious support for the senior Member of Parliament to run in the riding of Halton-Peel (taking in parts of Burlington, Milton and all of Georgetown, Acton and Caledon).

Said PC supporter Jack Reed to Mr. McDermid: "What can we do to make you run in this riding?"

The MP has some points in his favor if he decides to make a bid for the PC riding nomination. The Parliamentary Assistant to Pat Carney said four generations of McDermids have lived in the riding of Halton-Peel.

But Mr. McDermid said he would move into the riding if he ran here in the next election. Technically, the politician already lives in the riding because of a cottage he and his wife Elaine own in Caledon and use on weekends.

Another option for the former public relations manager and broadcaster is to quit politics altogether. "Shall I run again is another question," he said.

"It's getting tougher to leave my wife on Sunday nights and my age is a consideration. I'm 48 now." A person who is 50 isn't quite as marketable, he added.

In the end his decision will be based on "where you can do well and where the people want you."

Mr. McDermid said he is well known in the Caledon area because he ran for the nomination in 1971. He has also done some constituency work in Caledon because of the close proximity to the Brampton-Georgetown border.

Although he admits he doesn't have much of a base in Milton and Burlington, he does have many friends in that area.

In the last election, Mr. McDermid won 62 per cent of the popular vote in Georgetown, the highest of all his other Brampton polls.

Although Brampton-Georgetown started with no money 10 years ago, the Halton-Peel riding has reserve funds given to them by the dissolving PC associations surrounding them.

The politician shuttered at the thought of running again in Brampton-Georgetown if a snap election was called by the prime minister.

The MP says although he has one of the largest ridings in Canada, he has the same staff as his four counterparts in P.E.I. who have 130,000 constituents.

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**Labor wants an election over free trade agreement**

Halton Region won't go along with a request by the Oakville and District Labor Council to ask the federal government to call an election on the free trade issue.

Dave Tremblay, President of the Labor Council, said Oakville town council endorsed the request March 7 and the Labor Council wanted the Region's backing as well.

"We were led to believe the Prime Minister was against free trade in the last election," said Mr. Tremblay.

The resolution called for the federal government to either call an election of free trade or suspend any

other developments on free trade until after the next federal election. "We are not asking you to agree with our concern, but in a democratic society it is surely not too much to ask that a proposal which will have a profound effect on our whole nation."

Oakville Councillor Kevin Flynn appealed to Regional council to support the Labor Council's request.

If the effects of free trade are harmful to certain industries, the smaller municipalities in North Halton will be affected the worst, said Coun. Flynn.

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills has enacted By-law 88-18 to designate the "Williams Mill" and "Georgetown Electric Light Company Power Plant" at 515 Main Street, Glen Williams, on property described as Part of Village Lot 63, Plan 49 (south of Main Street) and Part of the West Half of Lot 21, Concession 10, as being of architectural and historic interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act.

**REASONS FOR DESIGNATION**

**"THE WILLIAMS HALL"**  
The structure is of heavy timber construction with mortice and tenon framing. The foundation walls are coursed rubble with timber framing having a clapboard cladding. The windows are 6 over 6 double hung. The building is one of the oldest remaining mills in Glen Williams. It was the site of Benajah Williams original saw mill erected in 1826 and has been in continuous use as a saw mill, hosiery, and apple processing factory.

**"GEORGETOWN ELECTRIC LIGHT COMPANY POWER PLANT"**  
This stone structure has large 5 foot by 8 foot casement windows employing single piece stone lintels and sills, and remains exist of an iron penstock and raceway. The building was the site of the Williams Flour Mill. The present building was constructed as an electric power generating plant, and was the first local building constructed specifically for the purpose of generating electricity for sale to the public.
