Graham wants commission disbandeded

Halton Police Chief James Harding may have a fight on his hands if he plans to stave off demands by an

Chief Harding and Coun. John gests. Graham took opposing views on the issue last week resulting in a comment by the Chief in a Burlington Spectator story March 17. The chief called Mr. Graham an "unlearned politician" for suggesting the police commission be abolished and made a committee of Regional council.

The two have agreed to disagree on the issue, said Mr. Graham, Mr. Graham, Regional Chairman Pete Pomeroy and Chief Harding met March 25 to clear the nir.

Both claimed the other made per-

sonal comments about them. Chief Harding is vowing to fight Oakville councillor to abolish the changes to the police commission along the lines Mr. Graham sug-

> Mr. Graham is planning to make a pitch to Regional councillors when Halton's budget comes up for ap-proval in April to change the nature of the police commission.

The final say in the matter rests with the province.

The police commission is made up of three civilian members appointed by the province and two regional councillors.

The civilian appointments are inevitably "friends of the province"

and are not accountable to the public, said Mr. Graham. Oakville's Fred Oliver and Burlington's James Grieve are the

Region's representatives on the commission. Mr. Graham is unhappy about the police commission's \$25 million budget which represents a 9.5 per

cent increase. Over \$600,000 is scheduled for new programs and personnel for the police in 1968. Chief Harding sald he needs the money just to keep up with

the crime rate. Coun. Graham said that amount is out of line with the Region which has budgeted just \$300,000 for new programs and services in 1988.

Once the police commission passes their budget, Regional council has no authority to change it, said Coun. Graham.

If council rejected the budget it would have to appeal it to the Ontario Police Commission and that is a lost cause, added Mr. Graham,

The Region attempts to limit increases to within cost of living guidelines and "the police commission has trouble living within double

that," said Mr. Graham. He said there is no effective con-

trol on the police budget. Coun. Graham said he is not happy about the 9.5 per cent increase in the police budget but he will support the Region's budget, which includes the
