Chateau takes consolation

Georgetown Chateau Restaurant Minor Bantam AAs finished their hockey season by winning the consolation championship of the NOHA Golden Puck Tournament held in North Bay recently.

One of only two OMHA teams in the entire tournament, the Chateaus were the only OMHA team in the 32-team Bantam Division.

The locals faced off against Sudbury in their first game and lost a heart breaker in the last minute of an almost penalty-free game.

After a two week layoff and having to adjust to the hard-checking style of the northern team, the Chateaus looked like they were going to tie Sudbury 1-1. But after almost three periods of hockey without an infraction, Georgetown took a high sticking penalty with 1:28 remaining. With only 19 seconds left in the game Sudbury put the game winner past John Katsilieris, who played outstanding goal for Georgetown and won the game's Most Valuable Player award.

Scoring for Georgetown was Chad Hartman, with an assist to Trevor Elineaky.

The second game was against Hallebury and the minor bantams met what later turned out to be the tournament champions.

Hallebury's team, as most NOHA teams are, was made up of a major

minor mix of players and the size and age difference combined with the very physical play, was too much for Georgetown and they went down to a hard 5-0 loss.

"We were beat by a bigger and better team," said coach Gary Hartman. "The boys played well but we just weren't going to beat that team."

Center Sean Guistini won the MVP award for Georgetown for his aggressive play.

Game Three was an early morning affair and Georgetown came out grumpy. The Chateaus wanted to forget the thumping they had taken the night before and they did it by beating Iroquois Falls 5-1 in a rough-and-tumble, penalty-filled game. Chad Hartman was the game's MVP with a two-goal and one-assist performance. Mark McIntyre, Sean Guistini and Trevor Elineaky each tallied with singles.

Game Four was a must-win game against Espanola and it turned out to be a real heart stopper.

The two teams were evenly matched but Georgetown managed to take a two-goal lead with markers from Trevor Elineaky and Doug Crawford. Espanola started their comeback with two quick goals early in the third period to tie it up and kept the pressure up for the rest of the game, but solid goaltending by

Peter Downs and a picture-perfect goal by Adam Hills late in the third period, gave the Chateaus the win they needed to advance into the consolation championship round. Trevor Elineaky's play making, and the fact that he figured in on all three goals for Georgetown, won him the game's MVP award.

The championship game was the toughest game the team played all season and the Chateaus had to come up with a super effort against West Nipissing.

It was a seesaw battle from the first faceoff with Georgetown drawing first blood when Duane Lewis picked up a Sean Guistini pass and put it in the net.

West Nipissing tied it up less than one minute later while Georgetown was short-handed. The Chateaus took the lead again when Adam Hills was given a penalty shot after being pulled down on a breakaway. Hills made no mistake pulling the goalie out and shooting it high on the stick side.

Midway through the third West Nipissing again tied it up while the locals were two men short. Trevor Elineaky put Georgetown ahead again with a short-handed goal, but the northern team again tied it up two minutes later. With overtime looming and both teams tiring from the physical beating this kind of game gives out, Georgetown had the puck in West Nipissing's end and with only 30 seconds left in the game Adam Hills picked up the loose puck and put it in the net unassisted for the game winning goal. Hills also won the MVP for his play in the championship game.

"This tournament is one of the biggest in the NOHA, and the competition here is the best of the north," said coach Hartman. "And I'm very pleased with the way the team played throughout the tournament. The boys earned the Consolation Championship and represented Georgetown, and the OMHA, very well."
