Overtime needed for 9-7 victory against Grimsby

Gemini Juveniles take series opener

In a wild and woolly display, the Georgetown Gemini Juveniles held on to edge the Grimsby Peach Kings 9-7 in overtime Tuesday night at the Alcott Arena.

The victory gave Georgetown a 1-0 lead in their best-of-seven Ontario Minor Hockey 'Association "AA" final series.

Game 2 in the set was Wednesday in Grimsby, and the third game will be back in Georgetown this Saturday at 8 p.m.

The series opener Tuesday was a wild one, as the locals led 4-1 at one point, and then watched as the Peach Kings stormed back to take a 6-4 lead by the mid way point of the third period.

"When we were up, with a 41 lead, we almost thought it had been too casy," said Georgetown coach Charlie Hanman following the game. "We did not play well defen-

sively. This team does not give up seven goals. We should never have let them get back in the game."

Hanman admits the Gemini Juveniles were perhaps lucky to come away with the win. But at the same time, he was pleased that his team could bounce back from the 6-4 deficit.

Georgetown faced the Kings once before, in the North American Silver Stick Championships at Mooretown. At that time, Hanman saw a small but fast team, and Grimsby produced the same sort of game Tuesday.

Georgetown opened the scoring late in the first period Tuesday when Rob Cooper put a rebound upstairs to make it 1-0.

Terry Dixon upped the count to 2-0 with just over three minutes left, as he slipped a puck under Kings' goalie John Astle after Bill Tutt had carried the play into the Grimsby

Georgetown took advantage of a powerplay opportunity in the first minute of the second period to extend their lead to 3-0. Pat McCarthy took a shot from the point that bounced high in front of the Grimsby net. The puck came down at the side, and Dixon was there to stuff it in.

The Kings got rolling at the threeminute mark of the period, when David Bardy went end-to-end and beat Georgetown goalie John Lantz with a shot inside the near post on the left side.

Hillier restored Mark Georgetown's three-goal lead when he jammed a puck in from a crown at 6:21.

But then the momentum began to shift Grimsby's way.

Phil Somers beat Lantz with a high shot to cut the lead to 42 at the second period break.

In the third, the Kings exploded with four goals, as Brian Cuthbert, Nick Butenko, and Bardy, with a pair, found the mark. That gave the Kings a 6-4 lead with 8:39 left in regulation play.

Georgetown finally snapped out of their lethargy, and mounted a comeback with just over eight minutes to go in the third.

Catching Grimsby changing their defencemen, Dixon took a rink wide pass from Steve Turner, and went in on the left side to beat Astle with a low shot.

Then less than a minute later, Brian Doberty took the puck out from the corner and flipped a backhand past Astle to put Georgetown even at six.

Dixon scored with 5:23 left on the clock to put the Gemini Juveniles in a precarious 7-6 lead.

Grimsby took advantage of a

powerplay situation as Dennis Doucette was off for cross checking, and Mike Koy whacked the puck in from a crowd in front of the Georgetown net.

Georgetown was all over Grimsby in the final few minutes of regulation, aided by back-to-back minors assessed to Bardy after their tying goal. But they couldn't get the puck past Astle.

It wasn't a powerplay goal that won the game for Georgetown, but it may as well have been. Kennedy got the winner, from Dixon and Cooper at the 32-second mark of overtime. just three seconds after Bardy had finished serving his time.


For good measure, Kennedy added an empty net marker with two seconds left to round out the 9-7 final.
