

**Sent to hospital**

Two people were sent to hospital following a 9:45 p.m. accident April 7 on Guelph Street and Normandy Boulevard. Angelo Civiero, 20, of Milton, and Janice Lynn Flynn, 30, of Halton Hills, were taken to the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital. A 1967 blue Chevrolet, driven by a 20-year-old Milton man, was westbound on Guelph Street travelling in excess of the speed limit. The Chevrolet collided with the left corner of a 1983 blue LeBaron, driven by a 30-year-old Halton Hills woman. The Chevrolet then crossed over the centre line and collided with a 1984 purple Oldsmobile, driven by a 19-year-old Georgetown man, which was travelling eastbound on Guelph Street. A charge of losing control and following too close was laid.

**Improper turn**

**Woman wants councillors to help in welfare fight**

Acton resident Muriel Czuber is asking the town for help in her fight to gain more welfare assistance but some councillors aren't entirely enthusiastic about the idea.



like you." She said no work is menial. "We don't consider any work menial. All work is honest." There has been a backlash from the community because of the Czubers' high profile, she said. "People saying we don't want hack jobs is most unfair."

Mrs. Czuber asked council for help in setting up a meeting with the Social Assistance Review Board Monday.

Saying she and her husband are living off her welfare payment of \$234 a month, Mrs. Czuber said she wants a fifth hearing in front of the Board.

She said most of the board members have been "fired" and she wants another hearing in front of the new board members but the Board Chairman won't return her calls. The four previous hearings were not impartial hearings but "cross-examinations", she said.

"I came to this place (the hearing was held at the town offices) - the scene of the crime - and I was told to shut up by a man who couldn't read. He was illiterate," said Mrs. Czuber.

Mrs. Czuber, who holds a masters degree in sociology, said she and her husband are moving now for the tenth time in eight years.

But it's hard to find a place because landlords don't like welfare recipients, she said.

Both she and her husband are unable to find work, she said. "I just don't know where you find a heated place for \$234 a month," she said.

Mrs. Czuber said after her 19 year career as a teacher in the separate school system ended she tried self-

ing life insurance and cemetery plots.

But no one would buy insurance during the recession in 1983 and the cemetery lands were swampy so no one would purchase plots, she said.

Her financial situation makes it impossible for her to live, she said. "I've lost my nerve to even phone prospective landlords."

Mrs. Czuber said her husband was told by a social assistance worker that he is "old and employers don't

During her fight to gain more welfare assistance, which included an appearance before Halton's Health and Social Services Committee, the Czubers were never told of legal assistance and other forms of help open to them, she said.

Since the Czubers have been on welfare "our life went crooked," she said.

"We've borrowed money from friends and relatives to get here." Mrs. Czuber said she is simply fighting for her rights.

"The Czubers have been about their rights from day one." When Councillor Betty Fisher said the request is in the Region's jurisdiction Mrs. Czuber said she gets no help from Region workers.

"The Region is my enemy." Bureaucrats just adhere to their "rules and their stupid regulations," she said.

But Acton Coun. Norm Elliott was in favor of at least getting in contact with the Board Chairman. "Is it possible in this small way we can help Mrs. Czuber?" he asked.

Council did not take any formal action on the request.
