Mrs. Czuber said she is simply fighting for her rights. "The Czubers have been about

their rights from day one." When Councillor Betty Fisher said the request is in the Region's jurisdiction Mrs. Czuber said she gets no help from Region workers. "The Region is my enemy."

Bureaucrats just adhere to their "rules and their stupid regulations," she said.

But Acton Coun. Norm Elliott was in favor of at least getting in contact with the Board Chairman, "Is it possible in this small way we can help Mrs. Czuber?" he asked.






