## Ladies' team runner-up at tournament

The Georgetown Women's Hockey Team competed at the world's largest ladies' hockey tournament hosted by Brampton on the Easter weekend, and came up with an excellent effort.

The Georgetown squad made it to the championship game of the C Division, before bowing 2-0 to Caledon.

A total of 202 teams took part in the tournament, with 18 of those teams comprising the C Division.

In their tournament opener, Georgetown was on top of their game against Milverton, and both teams came up with strong efforts, and had excellent scoring opportunities.

Georgetown opened the scoring in the second period as Denean Jones scored a shorthanded marker, assisted by netminder Joan Osborne.

The score remained 1-0 until the late going, when Milverton pulled their goalie in favor of an extra at-

tacker. With a minute to go, Georgetown's Monika Mastalerz found the open net to up the count to 2-0, and Osborne held on to earn the shutout.

Against Tavistock, their checking and team play was excellent, as they went on to a 2-1 victory.

The first period remained scoreless, thanks to the work of Osborne in net as she again had an outstanding game.

Tavistock opened the scoring in the second when they caught Georgetown on a line change.

But in the third, the locals bounced back to tie the game with a shorthanded goal by Jones, assisted by Michelle Richmond.

The game remained tied through regulation time, and was forced to a five-minute sudden death overtime.

It looked as though the matter

would still go unresolved until Tavistock was called for an intentional offside with just 10 seconds on the clock, and the face-off was deep in their end.

Georgetown controlled the puck off the face-off, and with only five seconds remaining on the clock, Mastalerz flipped a backhand shot past the Tavistock netminder to give Georgetown the win.

After receiving a bye to the championship game, Georgetown came up against league rivals, Caledon.

The only two goals of the championship contest were scored in the opening period, the first from a play that developed behind the net, and

the other from a rebound.

The entire game belonged to Caledon, as Georgetown came up with few quality scoring chances. But Osborne was again solid in net, and shut out Caledon the remainder of the contest.

It was a disappointing finale for the team, and their problems didn't stop with the scoreboard. In the final minute, Osborne went down with a sprained knee, putting her out of action for three to four weeks, which forced her to miss the provincial championships.

However, it was still quite an accomplishment for the team to finish second in their division.

## Juvenile Eagles getting jump on season

While major league baseball opened its regular season at the beginning of April, a month ahead of the Georgetown Juvenile Eagles, the local Juveniles were actually making serious preparations for their 1988 season two months prior.

Back in January, the Eagles, ranging in age from 17 to 19-years-old, began regular workout sessions in the high school gym.

By getting an early jump on the season, the team hopes to get a good start when they take to the field for regular play. Last year, a poor early season proved to be their downfall, and was a major reason the Eagles missed the playoffs, even though they put together 15 wins in their

final 20 games.

The added benefit of an early start will also prepare the team for a tournament they have entered. And the way things are shaping up, the team is not only confident they can do well in the tournament, but they are also optimistic they can claim an Ontario "A" championship.

The primary aim though, says coach Boyd Hoddinott, is to win the Ontario elimination series in early July, and the Canadian championship in August.

Coach Hoddinott feels that by putting together a larger pitching staff that works hard this goal can be achieved.

Returning to the helm of the Juvenile Eagles, along with Coach Hoddinott is Blaine Milton.

They will have virtually the same nucleus of players who comprised the team during the 1986 and 1987 seasons.

However, there will be a few new faces in the line-up who will help the team's chances immensely. One is longtime hockey coach Andy Williams.

A program will be published again this season for the Juvenile Eagles, which will include game schedules and player profiles.

The team got into the swing of things April 10, when they travelled to North York for an exhibition contest.

A return match will be played at the Georgetown Fairgrounds this Sunday.
