"When I started there were only four doctors," Mrs. King said. "Now there are more than you can count."

The Georgetown woman has no idea how many people she served or how many new faces she has seen during her quarter-century of

working at the IDA. She did get to know many of the girls who worked in the lawyers' and doctors' offices, she said, when they came in for stamps for the

daily mail. Harold Marshall, who Mrs. King considered "just a terrific postmaster, gave the postmistress her basic training.
"It was a job I enjoyed," she said.

Mrs. King decided to retire because she said, "I had reached that age." She had also accomplished what she had set out to do when she began.

Tasty Recipes

RATATOUILLE

- 1/2 cup olive or salad oil
- 1 large onion, diced 1 large garlic clove, cut in half
- 1 medium eggplant, cut in 1 inch chunks
- •1 large green pepper, cut in 1 Inch pieces
- •3 medium Zucchini, cut in 1 inch thick slices
- •1/2 cup water
- •1 tbsp. salt 2 tsp. oregano

 1 tsp. sugar •2 large tomatoes, cut in wedges In large pot over medium heat, in hot oil, cook onion and garlic until tender, about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally; discard garlic. Add eggplant and green pepper, cook for 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Stir in zucchini, water, salt, oregano and sugar; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to medium-low; cook 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender, stirring occasionally, stir in tomato wedges,

heat through, serve hol, or cover

and refrigerate to serve cold later.



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
