Condominium plan near Varian plant causes concerns

Residents and industry have mixed ideas about Georgetown's proposed condominium development.

The proposed development is 19.8 acres located east of Mountainview, south of River Road and north of the CNR tracks. The Millview Management Group wants to construct a 238-unit, nine-storey apartment building and 154 stacked and conventional townhomes.

The tentative development will require an access road. A proposal was submitted to town council to extend access to Mountainview Road from Maple Avenue.

Mountainview Road residents Myles and Ann Lawlor expressed concern about the proposed roadway.

"The proposed Mountainview Road access (to the condominiums) is of a major concern... the sight lines from the CNR bridge and the grading of the regional road Mountainview can be very hazardous," said Mr. Lawlor.

Mr. Lawlor expressed hope that Mountainview Road would be safer.

The Town of Halton Hills plans to expand Mountainview and to add a right-turn lane to decrease traffic problems.

"There are issues here of traffic concerns... I'd like to have a staff person there," said Councillor Pam Sheldon.

Coun. Sheldon also expressed concern for Varian Canada, located at Mountainview and River Roads. "We must confront this issue in keeping with our business development brochure," she said.

Microwave industry producers Varian Canada owns the industrial-zoned land north of the proposed development. General Manager Joe Caldarelli finds residential proximity a problem.

"We have long-range expansion plans which would involve the construction of a second facility (east) towards Maple Avenue," said Mr. Caldarelli. Town council recommended that a clause be included warning residents of impending Varian expansion.

(Varian has expanded "several times" since its 1955 opening. In 1985, the facility was extended 50,000 square feet.)

Mr. Caldarelli fears residential impact on his industry. Vandalism increased as developments such as River Run and Morley Mills (north of River Road) were constructed, he said.

"As residential development has increased in our vicinity in the last

few years, we have observed a noticeable increase in vandalism (and) in unauthorized use of the Varian site," said Mr. Caldarelli.

A further Varian concern is noise complaints from new residents. Varian operates around the clock, with machinery and cooling systems functioning 24 hours. Town council proposes a six-foot acoustical fence be built to reduce noise.

The proposed Mountainview development will include townhomes built in four phases of 30 to 45 houses, and an apartment building built in two phases.

The development issue, deemed "fairly aggressive" by Councillor Sheldon, requires a public meeting in the near future.

Under zoning bylaw 57-91, the proposed development is zoned agricultural land. There is an appeal to town council to change it to urban zoning, permitting 20 units per acre of residential land. The Millview Group will build 19.6 units per acre, thereby staying within town planning limits.

The present site east of Mountainview holds two houses and one unoccupied frame bungalow. Millview intends to tear these houses down, unless one house can be relocated and used for other purposes.

The development group does not intend to alter the terrain of their 20-acre lot: trees located east on the property will be retained.

Parking officers get \$2,000 raise

If you're one of the 9,000 or more people who've received parking tags from one of the town's two meter maids in the past year, consider how much it costs for the town to give you that ticket.

The two Parking Enforcement Officers employed by the town have just been given salary increases of about \$2,000 a year each.

One officer makes about \$7,800 while the other tops the \$7,300 mark after the increases.

A report by the town's Bylaw Enforcement Officer Bob Ustrzycki said the raises would put the positions in line with other

municipalities.

"The Parking Enforcement Officers are ambassadors of the municipality, being in constant view of and dealing with the public more than any other staff member of council," Mr. Ustrzycki said.

The raises came about because the officers' duties were expanded this year to include a variety of complaints, including the authority to have vehicles towed.

The extra duties put them in a higher category of work with increased responsibilities, said Mr. Ustrzycki.
