## Bantam bowlers relinquish title

Georgetown failed to retain its title in the World Bantam Bowling Championships, and had to settle for runners-up honors at the event, held in Guelph recently at Towne and Country Bowlarama.

After winning the championship last year, the Georgetown Bowl team narrowly missed repeating, as Roseland of Burlington took a five-pin victory.

Members of the team are Jeff Pringle, David Leslie, Alan Larocque, Chris Gostlin, and Ryan Martin.

Their coach is Gord Lane.

The championship, sponsored by Coca Cola, was changed significantly this year. The age group was lowered to 10 and 11-year-olds, while in previous years, the highest age was 12.

"The team did exceptionally well for this age," Lane said. "The team had a 177 per-game-average, which is very good for Bantams. There's a lot of pressure on kids that age."

The Georgetown team finished the competition with a two-game total of

1,727, while Burlington finished with a 1,732 total.

A total of 780 teams from throughout Ontario took part in the event, at the 24-lane Bowlarama.

University Bowl of Dundas was third in the competition with 1,661.

Individually, David Leslie of Georgetown took second place in for two-game score, with 428 (208 and 220). Allan Williamson of Roseland had the top two-game total with 438, while Ryan Anderson of University was third with 411.

## Blue Fins swim to seven new records

A total of seven new club records were set by members of the Blue Fins Swimming Club, as they competed at a meet in Pickering held April 10.

All the local competitors made strong showings, particularly in the 13-year-old and over groups where they were competing with some swimmers as old as 19.

Matthew Zuraw, 13, swimming in the boys' over-13 division picked up a second in the 100 m breaststroke, and a fourth in the 50 m freestyle, and added a fifth in the 200 m individual medley. In taking these honors, he set new club marks for the 100 m breaststroke, the 200 m individual medley, and also the 100 m butterfly.

In the girls' over-13 division, Cynthia Eccles, 14, picked up three gold medals in the 200 m individual medley, the 100 m butterfly, and the 50 m freestyle.

In the same age group, Dawn Newman, 13, won a gold for the 100 m breaststroke, and added a sixth in the 100 m backstroke.

Eccles set new club records for the 100 m butterfly, the 50 m freestyle, and the 200 m individual medley, and Newman set a new club mark for the 100 m breaststroke.

In the boys' 11 and 12-year-old

Noreen Ortila, competing in the girls' 11 and 12-year-old division, won a gold medal for the 100 m breaststroke, and also had a bronze for the 200 m individual medley, and a fifth place finish for the 100 m butterfly.

In the same category, Dione Benito picked up bronze medals in both the 100 m freestyle and the 100 m butterfly, and was also fourth in the 100 m backstroke.

Amy Kerslake had a fifth in the 100 m backstroke in the same age group.

In the girls' under-10 age group, Krista Smallwood captured two gold medals for the 100 m freestyle, and the 50 m freestyle.

Thane Goodlet, in the boys' under-10 division, won a silver medal for the 100 m freestyle, and also picked up bronze medals for the 100 m breaststroke and the 50 m freestyle.
