

Police beat

Slippery roads

Slippery roads caused a 5 p.m. accident April 29 at Trafalgar and Derry Roads. A beige Volkswagen Rabbit, driven by a 22-year-old Georgetown man, was stopped northbound on Trafalgar Road in a line of traffic for a red light. A silver Honda Prelude, driven by a 29-year-old Georgetown man, attempting to stop behind the Rabbit, lost control on the slick pavement and ran into the Rabbit.

Assault charge

An Acton man was charged with assault Level 1 following a quarrel with a 13-year-old Acton youth April 25 on Main Street in Acton. The 17-year-old appeared in court April 27, and was held in custody.

Failed to yield

A charge of failing to yield the right of way was laid following a 2:20 p.m. accident April 29 on Guelph Street. A 1981 white International, driven by a 42-year-old Alliston man, was stopped in a private drive at 246 Guelph St., facing northbound. The International was struck by a 1975 red GMC, driven by a 45-year-old Massey man, which was eastbound on Guelph Street in the right lane.

Cars collide

Two cars collided April 29 at a 1:56 p.m. accident on Maple Avenue and Charles Street. A 1982 brown Plymouth, driven by a 65-year-old Georgetown man, was turning left from Charles Street onto Maple Avenue. Once it was in the intersection, the Plymouth was struck by a 1980 red Honda Accord, which was travelling westbound on Maple Avenue, and was driven by a 37-year-old Erin man.

Study group commences

The study group looking into the landfill application in the Acton Quarry got underway yesterday (Tuesday) night with its first information meeting.

Milton councillor Bill Johnson will be the chairman of the meetings until they wrap up in October.

Mr. Johnson was elected chairman unanimously by the Proposed Acton Quarry Landfill Study Group two weeks ago. But Reclamation Systems Inc., the dump proponents, had not approved the chairman.

RSI representatives met with Mr. Johnson to iron out any conflicts he may have with his position as a Regional councillor.

The first of 13 information meetings discussed introductory hydrogeology and design, on Tuesday.

The meetings are a part of the pre-submission consultation process necessary to fulfill the requirements of the provincial Environmental Assessment Act.

Ratepayers settle with Board of Ed.

A motion put forth at Thursday's school board meeting to settle the outstanding court action with the Speyside Ratepayers was withdrawn by Georgetown trustee Dick Howitt.

The solicitors for both sides had already arrived at a settlement, Trustee Howitt said.

A lawsuit against the Halton Board of Education was initiated by the Speyside Ratepayers in June 1987 and in the fall adjourned to try and reach an agreement.

The closure of the public school resulted from a year-long consolidation study of all the schools in Halton Hills.

Howard Wrigglesworth Public School in Georgetown was also closed following the study.

Overnight campout

Slashed tires

Tires were slashed on a car parked at the Georgetown District High School April 27 at 72 Guelph Street. Damage was \$75.

Hosed down

A money change machine at a Guelph Street car wash received \$900 damage April 28 between 3:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. when a pressure hose was turned on it.

Window broken

A window and door of Robert Little Public School in Acton were broken April 30 by unknown means. Damage was \$250.

Headstone damaged

A headstone was pushed from its base in the Fairview Cemetery on Cobblehill Road in Acton May 1, and broken into several pieces. Damage was \$400.

Tools taken

Hand tools, valued at \$250, were taken from the old IGA building in Acton on Main Street sometime during the past weekend. Entry was gained by breaking the plate glass door window.

\$100 damage

Damage to tires slashed April 27 between noon and 4 p.m. to a car parked at 70 Guelph Street was \$100.

Car cut off

April 26 at 10:40 p.m. a 1985 red Pony, driven by a 34-year-old Glen Williams woman, was travelling eastbound on the 17th Sideroad. The driver alleges an unknown car cut her off and caused her to leave the road.

Impaired driving

A Hornby man, who was involved in an 11 a.m. accident on Trafalgar Road near 5 Sideroad April 26, was charged with impaired driving. The 41-year-old will appear in court May 30.

Church vandalized

Twelve windows were broken on the Churchill Community Church located on Lot 32, Concession 3 in Acton between April 29 and April 30. A large piece of a wooden fence was found near the windows. Damage was \$250.

Rocks thrown

Damage caused by rocks being thrown at 18 windows, a door and an air conditioner at Smith and Stone April 30 at 2:30 a.m., was estimated at \$1,200. Police are still investigating.

Careless driving

An 11:23 a.m. accident sent three to hospital April 30. Deborah Pearce, 32, of Georgetown, Tyler Pearce, 7, of Georgetown and Brandon Pearce, 3, of Georgetown were treated at the Georgetown District Memorial Hospital. A 1977 blue Pontiac, driven by a 16-year-old Georgetown woman, was westbound on Guelph Street. The Pontiac was approaching Edward Street and struck a 1985 grey Honda Civic, driven by a 32-year-old Georgetown woman. The Honda was stopped on Guelph Street waiting to make a left turn onto Edward Street. A charge of careless driving was laid.

Roof slashed

A boat, parked on Adamson Street in Norval had its canvas roof slashed between April 22 and April 27. Damage was \$400.

Council steamed at eyesores

Town councillors want to clean up the garbage in Halton Hills. Acton Councillor Norm Elliott wants an abandoned house on Crewson's Corners in the northwestern part of Halton Hills cleaned up and Mayor Russ Miller is threatening to walk onto a local plaza and clean up the mess himself.

Coun. Elliott said 18 truckloads of garbage were hauled out of the abandoned house two years ago by the owners but the property is still a mess.

"It's beyond belief to me that this sort of thing can be allowed to happen in our community," Coun. Elliott said of the house.

The porch in the back of the house is so full of garbage that it is falling away from the side of the house, he said.

Coun. Elliott said he peeked in the basement window and it too is full with garbage.

Neighboring residents have an eyesore to look at, he said.

The only way so much garbage could appear on the property is if it was hauled there, he said.

He wants the town's minimum standards bylaw to be extended to the rural areas as well.

Currently, the bylaw applies only to the urban areas.

The pumphouse in Acton is another area which needs cleaning up, said Coun. Elliott. The abandoned building poses a threat of litigation if someone gets injured on the property, he said.

Recently, someone has hauled several skids of sewer tiles to the land and they are beginning to fall over, he said.

"I want to see that property tidied up and locked up."

The problem lies with absentee landlords who don't care about their property, said Coun. Elliott.

He wants a bylaw "with teeth" that the town can enforce.

Mayor Russ Miller said garbage is collecting on the grounds of a plaza on the east side of Mountainview Road north of the intersection at Highway 7.

Wind blows the garbage into a pile up against the fence and no one bothers to clean it up, he said.

The Mayor said he's thought about walking onto the plaza and cleaning the mess up himself.

The plaza owner doesn't live in town, said Mayor Miller.

Bylaw Enforcement Officer Bob Ustrzycki said the town doesn't have the right to walk onto private property and clean up the mess without going through the provisions of the bylaw as set out by the province. The town can lay charges against the owners but it can take anywhere from three months to two years to get the issue resolved, said Mr. Ustrzycki. The town can't go after the business in the plaza because the garbage isn't coming from them, he said.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS

THE ONTARIO WEED CONTROL ACT AS IT APPLIES TO PERSONS IN POSSESSION OF LAND WITHIN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS

Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by May 29th, 1988, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens, the Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of municipal taxes.

Goatsbeard, thistles, chicory, poison ivy, ragweed, wild carrot, and milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding dandelion and golden rod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of The Weed Control Act.

Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.

Contract P-88-C-1
Longfield Road and Storm Outfall involving the reconstruction of Longfield Road from Orville Road to Churchill Road and a storm outfall from Churchill Road to the C.N.R. right-of-way.

Contract P-88-C-2
Wildwood Road Retaining Wall involving the construction of a Retaining Wall on the south side of Wildwood Road, approximately 450 metres west of Confederation Street at Park Street West.

Contract P-88-C-3
Glen Williams Bridge No. 3, involving the rehabilitation of the bridge deck on Main Street approximately 50 metres east of Confederation Street.

The Public is advised that the Bridge will be closed to vehicular traffic during the course of the rehabilitation, but will remain open to pedestrian traffic.
