#### Volunteers with CAS

# Driver sees progress of young

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was written by Karen Sloan, a second-year Journalism student at Sheridan College In Oakville, who is on a work placement at Halton CAS. After Ruth Bousfield settled her

three boys into school in 1978, she began inquiring about volunteer driving so she could help others. These inquiries led her not only into the Halton Children's Aid Society, but into many other community projects, as well. Ruth has driven for the Mothers'

Morning Out program for six years; first from Acton to Milton, then, when the Milton chapter closed, from Milton to Georgetown. Mothers' Morning Out involves weekly meetings of mothers of preschoolers who hear talks on such subjects as budgets, parenting, acci-dent prevention and image enhancement. A group of volunteers cares for the children during the meetings.

Children involved with the Society, need to be transported to medical appointments, play therapy, family visits, counselling sessions and support groups. Transportation is re-quired daytime and evenings. weekdays and weekends. The advantage of this role is its flexibility.

Some drivers prefer to drive at a specified time each week. He/she may drive one child to play therapy or transport moms and children to a group. Others prefer to be more flex-ible and fit in the drive requests when convenient, according to their changing schedules.

"The volunteer driving policy is to keep you with one client. After you're in it for a while, you notice the progress," she says. In fact, Ruth has been driving one single mother to CAS-related activities for three years. She says she can see how the group benefits both mother and her children. "You see changes," she says. "They smlle again and have fun." Ruth has noticed the children who have been badly hurt usually have a chip on their shoulders and are very suspicious. When they see something stable in their life, a car coming each week faithfully, they begin to open up.

Ruth has also been involved in the Society's Volunteer and Community Resource Committee (VCRC) assisting with public relations work in the community. She has worked as a volunteer, and with the VCRC committee dealing with the Volunteer Incentive Fund for

children who are clients of the Society, but not receiving financial help. The money from the Volunteer Incentive Fund goes towards bikes for paper routes, gymnastics, dancing or music lessons, and many extra activities that the families cannot af-

The committee also brings recom-mendations to the Board of Directors on volunteer related projects. Ruth is a member of the Halton CAS Board of Directors and helps maintain contact between the volunteers and the Board.

Outside of the Halton CAS, Ruth is active in the Milton community. She has been helping the Milton Com-munity and Information Services. which is starting a new service in the area, called Information Milton, a non-profit organization that provides the community with informa-tion about coming events. Buth also participates in the annual Milton Fall Fair. She helps with the junior exhibits between 12 and 18 years of age, takes in entry forms, and sets the prize lists. In addition, she is ac-


