Dyer, Mulholland lead way

## GDHS claims first Rebel Classic crown

Mike Dyer copped three first-place finishes and Sara Mulholland grabbed a pair of golds to help lead the GDHS Rebels to the overall title in the first ever Rebel Track and

Field Classic on April 27. Dyer finished first in three junior boys events - 100-metres (11:40), 200metres (23:07) and 400-metres (54:27) - while Mulholland was tops in both the midget girls 800-metre

(2:38.74) and 1500-metres (5:29.63). GDHS edged out White Oaks of Oakville to wear the first Rebel Classic crown.

The wet weather did little to dampen a fired-up GDHS squad which produced 11 more first place finishers. They included:
