# GDHS claims first Rebel Classic crown

Mike Dyer copped three first-place finishes and Sara Mulholland grabbed a pair of golds to help lead the GDHS Rebels to the overall title in the first ever Rebel Track and Field Classic on April 27.

Dyer finished first in three junior boys events - 100-metres (11:40), 200-metres (23:07) and 400-metres (54:27) - while Mulholland was tops in both the midget girls 800-metre (2:38.74) and 1500-metres (5:29.63).

GDHS edged out White Oaks of Oakville to wear the first Rebel Classic crown.

The wet weather did little to dampen a fired-up GDHS squad which produced 11 more first place finishers. They included:

If Saturday's opening day of trout fishing along the Credit River is any indication, the 1988 season could be a banner year for local anglers.

The annual casual fishing derby at Fred's Bait Shop in Norval drew another hefty number of entrants and according to shop owner Fred

Howse several large fish were hauled in over the day. "The fish really co-operated," said Mr. Howse. "It was a super weekend."

The judging was done by length and Mr. Howse says local anglers were invited to bring in their catches

and see how they had fared during the course of the contest.

This year's winners were Steve Murphy of Mississauga and Eugene Klingdeil of Guelph. Murphy had the largest Rainbow at 28 and one half inches while Klingdeil caught a 15-inch to win the Speckled division.

"The Speckled were great last weekend," said Mr. Howse, who has sponsored the local derby for the past six years.

The 1988 fishing season marks the second year that anglers in Ontario have required licences and Mr.

Howse said sales have been brisk throughout the year. "A lot of people have purchased them early to avoid the rush," he said. "We've sold about the same number as last year but spread out over the year. Last year they were lined up at the door on opening day."

Mr. Howse says it should be a good year for local anglers in search of Rainbow and Speckled trout. He maintains that catching Rainbow is about, "10 per cent luck and the rest is skill."

"Anyone can go out and catch a fish," says Mr. Howse. "But to do it consistently takes skill."
