Year-round RIDE shows results

Of 40 Ontario motorists charged with drinking and driving offences during the first week (April 17 to 23) of the new OPP year-round RIDE program, 25 per cent (10) were caught in the vicinity of Metro Toronto.

The OPP RIDE team working in the Toronto area, stopped almost 2,500 vehicles during its first week of operation and charged the 10 drivers with drinking and driving offences.

"Clearly there is a problem with some motorists thinking that they can drink and drive on provincial highways," said Insp. Norm Wasyluk. "That kind of thinking is deadly. It costs lives and it must stop."

During the first week of operation, the OPP stopped 28,009 vehicles across the province. In addition to the 40 drivers charged at the OPP checkpoints, 118 other motorists were given 12-hour license suspensions.

"As the OPP RIDE Program Coordinator, I am confident that the year-round OPP RIDE initiative will help make our highways safer for all motorists," said Insp. Wasyluk.

The OPP RIDE team working in the London area stopped 4,816 vehicles and charged only one person with a drinking and driving offence. The Ottawa area OPP RIDE team stopped 2,437 vehicles and charged three motorists with drinking and driving offences.

The OPP RIDE team working out

of Thunder Bay stopped 1,071 motorists and charged seven with a drinking and driving offence.

Earlier this month, OPP Commissioner Tom O'Grady assigned 96 officers to work full time on the year-round RIDE program following the commitment of \$14 million by the Ministry of the Solicitor General.

"The six-officer teams working out of each of the force's 16 district headquarters are discovering that drinking and driving isn't behavior associated solely with the holiday season," said O'Grady. "We are convinced that the year-round RIDE program will save lives and reduce injuries."

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OPP cycles now radar-equipped

In what may be a North American first, the Ontario Provincial Police has equipped the Force's motorcycles with the sophisticated Moving Digital Radar (MDR-1) units. The MDR-1 is the same unit used in provincial highway cruisers.

"Last year, 806 people died in accidents on roadways patrolled by the OPP," said Insp. Bill Wicklund of Traffic and Marine Section. "We estimate that excessive speed was a factor in 47 per cent of all traffic accidents."

"By equipping our motorcycles with this advanced enforcement tool, we double the number of radar units in the southern Ontario area," he said.

The MDR-1 can be used to record the speed of another vehicle regardless of whether the vehicle is approaching, departing or parallel to the motorcycle. It has a range of approximately one and a half kilometres and can be programmed to ignore slow moving trucks and concentrate only on traffic moving at higher speeds. It can also record a violator's speed before a radar detector (illegal in Ontario) can sound a warning.

Unlike handheld radar units, which necessitate the officer coming to a stop beside the roadway, the MDR-1 is easily operated while the motorcycle is in motion. All of the controls are within comfortable

reach and the readout is within the driver's field of vision.

Designed and tested last year by Prov. Const. Keith Taylor of Cambridge detachment and Prov. Const. Roger Neal of Guelph detachment, the MDR-1 mounts above the motorcycle instrument panel and the antenna is affixed to a bar near the operator's knee. When it rains the unit can be removed and placed in a waterproof saddlebag.

"The introduction of radar equipped motorcycles makes for an effective tool to curb speeders," said Insp. Wicklund. "We write tickets for one reason - speed kills and ticketing violators saves lives. It's that simple."
