I was told that our strike was a mild one. During the 48-day period, we had seven incidents where our people were charged, two for throwing eggs.

Yes, there were occasions when we were frustrated. Management personnel worked 5-10 hour days and Saturday and Sunday, also, Stratford and Mitchell people came in to work here in Georgetown.

For 29 years we had a good relationship with management here in Georgetown. Better than in any S.P. division, with very, very few grievances. I do not think that it will be the same when we return to work.

I was very proud of my colleagues during the strike for the way we stuck together.

But I am also very sad that the CAW Rep. Michael McKinnon was transferred, he has four other sets of negotiations going at the present time. He did a terrific job for us.

Also I would like to thank Linda Corkum and Dave Thompson, who were on the bargaining committee; recording secretary Norma Lawrence, who was in the office 40 hours a week, and Shirley Newman, financial secretary, who was constantly looking after supplies for the picket line.
