Council will conduct a Public Meeting to examine and discuss applications to amend Georgetown Zoning By-law 57-91, and for a Plan of Condominium. The proposed development involves land described as being Part of Lot 16, Concession 10, Georgetown which has a total area of about 8.09 hectares (20 acres). This property is generally located between Mountainview Road and the road extension of Maple Avenue, north of the Canadian National Railway.

Ah, summertime... sunbathing on beaches, catching drips of ice cream on the tongue and chasing frisbees in the park. For students, the long, lazy months mean a summer job. Halton Hills students can begin their quest for employment at the Student Employment Centre, which opened May 2, located at 232 Guelph St. The centre is in the same place as last year, behind the Canada Employment Centre. Basically the centre is a referral agency and acts as a liaison between the students and employers, said student placement officer Angela Buskard. Ms. Buskard is a fourth-year sociology student at Queen's University. Students come in, register and check the job boards. If they see something they are interested in, they are screened. Often employers, who give a job order, have specific requirements they need filled, such as education, special interests - or work boots. If they meet the requirements, the students are referred to the employer, and it is up to the student to arrange an interview time. The placement officers like to refer at least three people to employers, to give them more options. Working through the Student Employment Centre saves employers time, said Ms. Buskard. They are not bombarded with students, who may or may not fit the job, as is sometimes the case when they place ads in newspapers. In 1987, approximately 900 students registered with the centre, while about 500 students found placements. When students come in, Ms. Buskard said, they are encouraged to not only use the centre's services to get a job, but to also use resources such as friends, relatives and newspaper ads. As well as helping to find students jobs, the two placement officers also counsel students on job search techniques. Students may come in with no idea of what they want, said Ms. Buskard. "We try and determine what kind of employment they want and focus them." They help with their resumes and offer interviewing tips. "Some grade nines have never gone out to an interview before," said Karen Coats, who is headed for London's University of Western Ontario in the fall to attend teacher's college. Job prospects for students are high this year. "In general I would be quite optimistic about it," said Ms. Buskard. At the moment there are mostly restaurant and general labor jobs on the board. There are also a number of career-oriented jobs, which are government subsidized, aimed for post-secondary students. Summer jobs help students earn extra money for school, travel or just gives them extra spending money. It also gives them experience in their chosen field or just the work world. "It gives them an idea of what they want to do in university," Ms. Coats said, "or it may work the other way, and show the students what they may not want to do." To prepare themselves for a summer job search, Ms. Buskard suggests students start early. They should keep a positive attitude and be prepared to apply to many places, not just one, she said. Students should also be persistent and not wait for the employer to phone them. Placement officers will be travelling to area high schools, to give students from the Georgetown District, Acton and Bishop Reding schools an opportunity to register. A job board is located at the Acton Social Services and Information Centre.

AS IT APPLIES TO PERSONS IN POSSESSION OF LAND WITHIN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS 6
Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by May 29th, 1988, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens, the Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of municipal taxes. Goatsbeard, thistles, chicory, poison ivy, ragweed, wild carrot, and milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding dandelion and golden rod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of The Weed Control Act. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
