# Wildcats claw soccer Rebels

A late goal off a corner kick killed the comeback hopes of the GDHS Rebels senior girls soccer team as they dropped a 3-1 decision to White Oaks Wildcat last Wednesday at the Georgetown field.

The Rebels were down 2-0 at the half but fought back to narrow the White Oaks margin to 2-1 before surrendering the late insurance goal. The loss dropped GDHS to a 1-3 win-loss record in league play while improving the Wildcats to a perfect 4-0. Becky Dobbins scored the lone GDHS goal.

Despite the loss Rebel coach Sheena Kewley was encouraged by the Rebel effort particularly during the majority of the second half when stingy defence and alert ball control kept White Oaks off the scoreboard until late in the contest.

"We're not a 1-3 team," she said after the match. "We played well. White Oaks has been a COSSA finalist for the past two or three years. We were competitive today."

Mrs. Kewley cited centre-forward Shannon O'Donnell and inside halfbacks Sue Taylor and Julie Ross for their stellar play. "Shannon was just outstanding," said Mrs. Kewley. "She's the heart of our backfield. Sue and Julie were solid, they both played well."

White Oaks took a 1-0 lead early in the first half as they capped off a pretty passing play by beating Rebel keeper Lorna Richards. Richards got a piece of the ball on

the second White Oaks goal, a hard drive from the right side which just eluded Richards' outstretched hands.

Early in the second half GDHS displayed some sound defensive work and ball control which stifled the White Oaks offence although the Rebels were still unable to penetrate the Wildcats' defensive clog.

Persistence finally paid off, however, in the form of a GDHS offensive foray into the White Oaks zone with forward Becky Dobbins hammering home a shot.

With their deficit cut to 2-1 GDHS poured it on but an experienced and well-drilled White Oaks side maintained its composure. A corner kick to White Oaks late in the game sealed the Rebels' fate as a Wildcat scramble in front of the GDHS goal resulted in an insurance marker for the visitors.

The senior side will resume its schedule on Monday, May 16 with a home date against Oakville's Queen Elizabeth Park. Coach Kewley is confident the Rebels will continue to improve as league playoffs approach.
