## GMHA loses bingo

Herald Sports Editor There will be no GMHA Monster Bingo tomorrow night at the Alcott Arena and Wayne Prics is not happy about the situation.

The financially-strapped GMHA had originally scheduled the Monster event for May 19 but found out just last Wednesday that their plans would have to be shelved. The association had planned to offer a total of \$10,000 in prizes with a grand prize of \$3,000.

According to Pries, past president of the GMHA, the association was informed last week that only one Monster Bingo may be held over a three-week period within a radius of 50 miles. Apparently a Monster event had already been scheduled for Etobicoke on June 3.

"It's a dirty rotten deal," sald Pries on Monday. "Apparently commercial bingo operators complained about other groups holding Monster Bingos and now the ministry (Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations) sanctions only one a month within a 50-mile radius."

But according to Pries, the GMHA also learned that a second Monster Bingo is being staged on June 11 at Copp's Collseum in Hamilton. That bingo is apparently being staged by the Hamilton Rotary Club for Polio Plus and will offer upwards of

\$180,000 in prizes. Pries said the approval of the Hamilton event would mean there are two Monster Bingos scheduled for June within a 50-mile radius of each other. "That shoots down the theory," he said. According to Pries, the ministry was not aware of the Hamilton event.

"The ministry sald they weren't aware of the one at Copp's and they sald they were going to check it out," he said.

Pries said the GMHA also learned that a bingo operation in Etobicoke has apparently booked one Monster Bingo a month for the entire sum-

mer. "They've tied up all the Toronto and Hamilton areas," he said.

Pries said the GMHA prepared its application for a Monster Bingo with the approval of the Town. The Association was apparently told its application was in order and that receiving ministry approval was, "just a formality," said Pries.
"There was no indication it wouldn't be approved."

The GMHA may have wasted time by not submitting its application for approval sooner, said Pries. "That was probably an error on our part," he stated. "We rushed it

through." But Pries is still not convinced of the fairness of the ministry ruling. "Why is it the ministry's responsibility to ensure the commercial

operators a profit?" plaints came from commercial bingo operators who said one-time Monster Bingos were hurting their operations," said Pries. "We have no intention of competing at that level."

Pries said the restriction, in effect, limits the ability of small town operations - such as minor hockey to make money. "It's unfortunate,"

"We were looking at the \$10,000 range," he continued. "The problem is that we (GMHA) are in the hole. Commercial operators - can run Monster Bingos and we'll have to

start applying for 1990." Pries said the GMHA had hoped to operate the event this month after enjoying success with a previous one last year. The restriction will force the association to abide by a \$3,500 maximum prize ceiling (approved by the Town) for its next potential bingo. "We wouldn't need ministry approval for that," explained Pries. "But it doesn't have the same attraction."

Meanwhile, Halton North MPP Walt Elliot told The Herald on Monday that a restriction limiting Monster Bingos to one every three

weeks in a 50-mile radius was indeed imposed by the Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations, but he wasn't sure if the ruling was, "written in stone."

"The guidelines are in place to be fair," he said. "Too many Monster Bingos were causing a 'dry-up' in

the area." Elliot said he understood there was already one Monster Bingo in place for the area in June and that the GMHA bid was late. He said he didn't realize the association's bingo had not been approved until last week when he noticed there was no provincial licence number attached

to their advertising. Elliot added that he would be checking out the GMHA claims that an Etoblooke bingo operation had booked the summer months up for "From what I understand com? Monster Bingos. "The whole guideline would be down the drain if that's the case," he said.

However, Elliot sald it was possible for one group to pre-book the Monster schedule for an entire summer. "Technically in a 50-mile radius there could be a lot of applications in," he stated.

The ministry usually requires about six months notice in advance of a Monster Bingo application, said Elliot. "There's a lot more to it than

meets the eye." He said if the GMHA planned far enough in advance there should be no problems in securing a date for a future Monster Bingo.

Diane Roy, hall manager for Diamond Bingo in Etobleoke, was unavailable for comment prior to press time. Tim McLaughlin, a Dlamond employee, said the local charitable organizations that use the Diamond bingo facilities usually handle their own bookings and special event applications.

"There aren't that many Monster Bingos," he said.

The GMHA approached the ministry directly last week in a bid to win approval for its May 19 event, but was turned down.

## Rebels send 45 to GHAC

Forty-five GDHS athletes will carry the Rebel colors into the GHAC track and field finals tomorrow after the team placed a strong second at the annual Halton meet last week in Burlington.

"We were very pleased with our performance," said Rebel co-coach Donna Metcalfe of the team's outing in the Haltons on May 10-13. "The team did very well."

Rebels scored a total of 15 firsts as 45 athletes in 70 events qualified for the GHAC's. Individually, Dave Paul led the red, white and blue charge as he took gold in three events · 2000- metre steeplechase (6:21.9), senior boys 3000-metre run (9:00.5) and 1500-metre run (4:03.38).

Mike Dyer also shone for GDHS as he placed first in both the junior boys 100-metre (11.3 seconds) and 400-metres; Yanne Letarnec, 2nd, 200-metre (23.18) events as well as sharing a gold as a member of the school's open boys division 4x400

Two other members of that team also won individual gold as Glenn Mulder copped the junior boys 400metres (52.71) and Yanne Letarnec was tops in the senior boys 800-metre

run (1:59.34). Other individual firsts went to Natalie Goldson with a 13.7 clocking in the midget girls sprint hurdles, Holly Sones with a heave of 8.46 metres in the midget girls shot put, Lisa Carter with a time of 61.97 in the junior girls 400-metre event and Mark Dunning who tossed the senior boys discus a distance of 41.20 metres.

Georgetown took first place in both the open girls and open boys 4x400 relay. The girls squad of Shannon Snyder, Lisa Carter, Anna Toone and Tara Burroughs won their event in a time of 4:15.46 while the boys team consisting of Glenn Mulder, Rick Lane, Mike Dyer and Yanne Letarnec turned a 3:27.78 to win their final heat.

Both the midget girls and junior girls 4x100 relay teams came away with gold at the Halton meet, hosted by Burlington's Nelson Secondary School. Kristy Lewis, Laura Homer, Natalle Goldson and Triaha Harkley teamed up to win the midget division with a final 54.75 while the junior team of Anna Toone, Michelle Thompson, Lisa Carter and Tara Burroughs turned in a solid 51.94 finish to win their event.
