## Soccer World clinic

Soccer World is an indoor soccer facility which has had an arena in Ancaster for a few years and caters for all sizes, sexes and ages in practice and competition. Earlier this year another arena was opened at Daralea Heights, at the main junction of the 401 and Dixie. There are several leagues which operate in the premises and recently the Ontario Indoor X Cup Finals were hosted there. John McGrane, former Los Angeles Aztecs (and a Scot) is one of the leading lights in the company. The manager of the Mississauga facility is David Gee, a Liverpoolian and former Toronto Emerald.

The company is a keen supporter of soccer and hope that the arena facilities will be well used. Of course it is a commercial enterprise. The arena is already well used and the owners on occasion put on clinics to put something back into the game.

Such an event will take place on Wednesday, June 29 by way of a goalkeeping clinic, which is free. Goalies between the ages of 11 and senior and residents of Peel Halton are the conditional entries. The clinic begins with meeting at Soccer World and thence to Darryside Park for the demo and continues until 3:30 p.m. Although details of registration are a little sketchy a telephone call to David Gee and his staff at 848-2310 or better still at 670-0632 will bring more detail.

Head coach for the day is Bob Wilson, former Arsenal and Scotland international goalkeeper who specializes in clinics of this nature. Wilson is also a current BBC commentator on soccer. Others are Mike Povey, himself a former English and NASL league goalie, and MTV soccer commentator, Dick Howard, CSA Technical director and former goalkeeper and others of coming stature.

George Baines, the local club vice president and head coach, is now to be often seen around the fields encouraging house league coaches in doing their coaching. Baines has been keen to train or coach the coaches. Sometimes a coach is just someone who is there and basically organizes the team without much expertise in coaching or the game itself. An approach by Baines or his new henchman, Harry Jackson, an England FA national coach, should be seen as support troops and use these experienced guys as much as you can. Over the years we have attempted to put on our own coaches clinics and they have not been too well attended which is a pity. There is a great deal of knowledge and experience around this locality and not too well drawn upon.

At the same time Luc Bertrons has once again managed to obtain the services of a number of new persons willing to try their hand (and feet) at refing. Encouragement is necessary here also, and support from the older and experienced officials would be welcomed. The 'big brother' system of putting younger and inexperienced referees in training with their older experienced counterparts is a system working in other areas and has been tried here with some success.

As a final thought in this area, it is not only with officials, coaches and goalies that specialized clinics could be held. Defenders, strikers, midfield players and administrators could well do with their own clinics.

Watched part of a bantam girls match between the yellows and maroons and was very impressed with the fitness, quality and enthusiasm of the play. Each team had one 'star' player who seemed to hold the ball just a bit too long before releasing. Each team had a player or two in the not so good category in skills. Both teams had the re-

mainder in good quality in passing, positional play and skills. If this is the standard of this year it should be an interesting one indeed.

Georgetown United had a fair baptism into the 'big leagues' as coach Sammy Inglis put it so aptly. Turning out in the Willowdale tourney at the weekend the lads were given a 4-0 loss by Toronto Emerald and 4-1 defeat from Armourdale as part of the final lead in games to the actual league commencement. The Falcons first Peel Halton game is on the 29th in Mississauga.

Wednesday being the opening day of the Inter County league I tried to pay a visit to all the fields in town before the Mariner match. The only one not visited was Christian field where the road was blocked by a choo choo stopping half way across the level crossing. At Alcott Villa came and went with both points in a 3-1 loss handed out to Varian with some good soccer coming from the visitors.

Another good entertaining game was seen at Meadowglen with United (Meteor variety) and Crown and Anchor stroking the ball around where the match ended in a 0-0 tie. The late game at Alcott had Plus Welding and Ajax in opposition. Plus opened the scoring in the first 10 minutes and that was enough to seal the points. The Ancient pulled off a 4-1 victory over Trexcon in a game which could easily have the gone other way.

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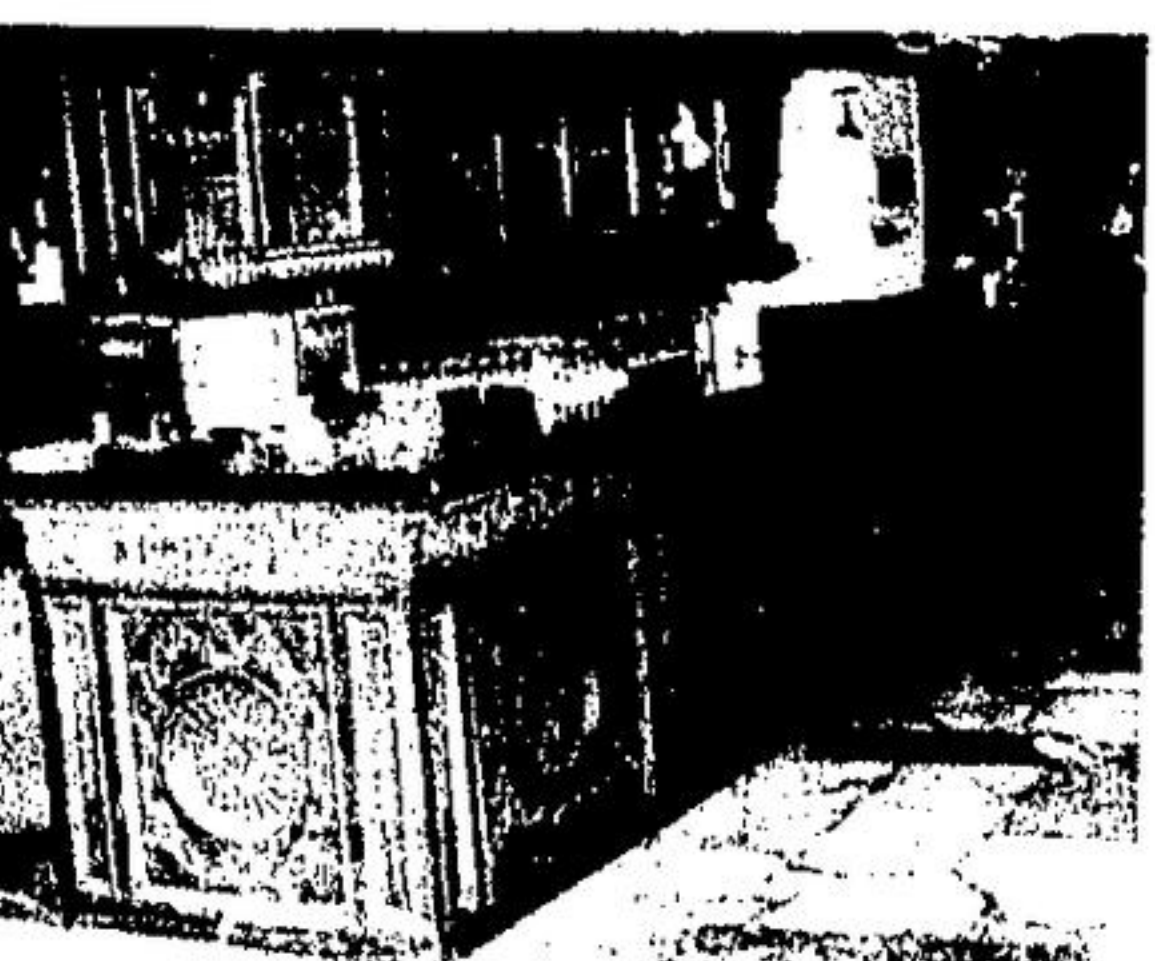
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
