Parties making ready

Two political parties have already launched their campaigns from the starting gate in Halton Peel and the third party is not far behind.

Both the Progressive Conservalues and the Liberals have set dates for their nomination meetings but the New Democratic Party has yet to even field a candidate.

The Liberals will kick off election preparations June 10 at Gordon Alcott Arena where Milton's Orienna Currie and Caledon's Pierre Klein will battle it out for the Liberal nomination.

The Tories will follow suit 12 days later at the same place but they have four candidates declared. Carlo Testa, Warren Hilliard, Rod Pinkney and Garth Turner will vye for the PC nomination at Alcott June

The New Democrats will meet in Oakville at the Galaxy Hall June 8 to discuss election strategy and possibly set a nomination date.

The cutoff dates for declaring candidacy to seek the PC nomination and for purchasing a membership to the party is June 17, said Halton-Peel riding president Ian Fraser.

The local association will not know what their financial situation is until the new boundaries take effect July 13. That's when other riding associations which merge to form the new riding (there are four altogether) will each pitch in their share of the

"We're more than ready to go to battle," said Mr. Fraser, who ex-

pects a fall election. But the rules are different for the Liberals. Riding President Joe Hewitt said the Grits' cutoff date for signing up new memberships was

However candidates could declare their intention to run until today (June 1).

Financially, the Liberals are in the same boat as the Conservatives, said Mr. Hewitt. Their financial status is in limbo until other riding associations merge their funds with

Georgetown on July 13. But the controversy surrounding the \$6 million deficit the federal party has incurred has not significantly affected Halton Peel, said Mr. Hewitt.

"I don't ... think it affected the local ridings that much." The Grits have about 800 members

signed up for the nomination meeting, he added. NDP riding president Alian Moore

said his party is in no hurry. "There's not very much you can

do when there's no election been called," he said. "Everybody seems to be in a mad

hurry to get a candidate." Although no one has declared their intention to seek the NDP party nomination in Halton Peel, Mr. Moore said there are "a few interested parties."

Campbellville's Bill Johnson, a regional councillor, who ran twice provincially, was rumored to be ready to run but he ruled that out yesterday (Tuesday). Mr. Johnson said he intends to run for a spot on Halton Regional council again in November's municipal elections.
