Hardly a Saturday goes by from May 1 to September 30 that doesn't see wedding cars parked at the front door and a bride and groom having their pictures taken with the golf course and ponds in the background.

With breakfast becoming a popular time to conduct Business Meetings the Kitchen and Dining Room staff now find themselves starting at 7 a.m. many times during a month to accommodate this ever increasing business.

Golf being the main activity and involving a larger membership than other categories creates a very busy summer and the Club hires many part-time students from the community. Tennis is an added feature at the Club with an active program run by the Tennis Committee and the Tennis Pro. The Curling membership has declined over the last couple of years but it is hoped this membership will pick up again and keep this winter sport at the Club.



Over the years the Club has promoted Sunday Brunches which have now become so popular there are often 200 people attending brunch and if a reservation is not made members find themselves not being able to be accommodated. Another popular event at the Club is Lobster Night with live lobster flown in from Nova Scotla.



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
