**Exciting exhibition  
planned for gallery  
featuring impressionist**

A colorful collection of impressionist paintings by Toronto artist Barbara Howard will hang in the Library-Cultural Centre gallery in Georgetown this summer.

The exhibition of a wide variety of work by this major Canadian artist promises to be one of the highlights of the year for the increasingly popular local gallery.

On view for a period of six weeks, June 29 to Aug. 6, an Opening Gala is planned by the Friends of the Halton Hills Libraries. The public is invited to meet the artist and other special invited guests.

Tickets for the opening are available at the Public Libraries in both Acton and Georgetown.

The Howard collection will include everything from the artist's brilliant large impressionist landscapes and seascapes to drawings and tiny wood carvings, representing a major portion of her interests and work over the past number of years.

John Sommer of The Gallery House Sol and a member of The Friends committee who will mount the collection, says he believes local art patrons will be thrilled with the beautiful and varied work chosen for The Friends' fourth summer exhibition. Many pieces are new and have been especially done for this show.

"Barbara Howard is one of the foremost artists in the country," says Mr. Sommer. "We are thrilled she will be exhibiting here in Halton. I am hopeful that many local people will take advantage of the opportunity to see her unique work while it is on display locally."

Following the opening on June 29, the exhibition will be open for viewing during regular gallery summer operating hours, Tuesday through Saturday, until Aug. 6.

**Pick-your own reports  
set to begin on June 9**

The Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food's Farm Market News Service will begin a new season of Pick-Your-Own radio reports prepared by Bob Cobbleddick, a farm marketing specialist. The reports will start June 9, and will be available every Thursday until the end of the growing season in mid-October.

"The report lets people know when a crop is ready for picking, how big it will be, and the area in Ontario where it is located," Mr. Cobbleddick says. "One of the biggest advantages of picking your own fruits and vegetables is the price of produce about half the retail price."

About 400 farms are participating this year, from London to Port Hope and north to Georgian Bay, with more than 20 different fruit and vegetable crops to pick.

**Hogan manages to save Dundee**

Paul Hogan, the Australian actor and ad man par excellence, is back. Hogan is alive and well and has spent too much time in New York City. *Corcodile II* is a mish-mash of plot and setting, moving from Colombia to N.Y.C. to Australia in a cliché between good guys and bad, between Dundee and drug smugglers. The freshness of the original movie is lost in this all too familiar plot.

Really, Mr. Hogan, Americans make enough of their own cops and dope-runner films, there is no point

with the film: Dundee is just too invincible. No one is that clever or lucky. It gets kind of boring. We know that Mick will outsmart them, but does it have to be that easy? Come on Mick, give the lads a hand-icap at least.

Paul Hogan is certainly the only reason to see these movies. He is a born charmer and one can't help liking him. (However, I never lust in my heart for blond men.) The role is hardly challenging. As Hogan himself says, he's 'no Laurence Olivier.' And the plugs for Foster's Lager are numerous. Talk about American corruption - Hogan could teach Madison Avenue a thing or two.

The forgettable Linda Koslowsky is the forgettable Sue Charlton, the girlfriend. She did not make much of an impression on me in the first film and she continues to be a thoroughly negligible presence in the sequel. I hope Hogan didn't pay her too much.

All in all Dundee is okay. You won't feel cheated paying money to see it, but you have to like Paul Hogan - a lot. Besides, the theatre is air-conditioned and we're in for a heat wave this week.

**Author's book helps employers**

Executives, managers and supervisors, battered by the winds of change within the corporate structure, have been searching for a way to bridge the gap between knowing what the problems are and doing something to solve them.

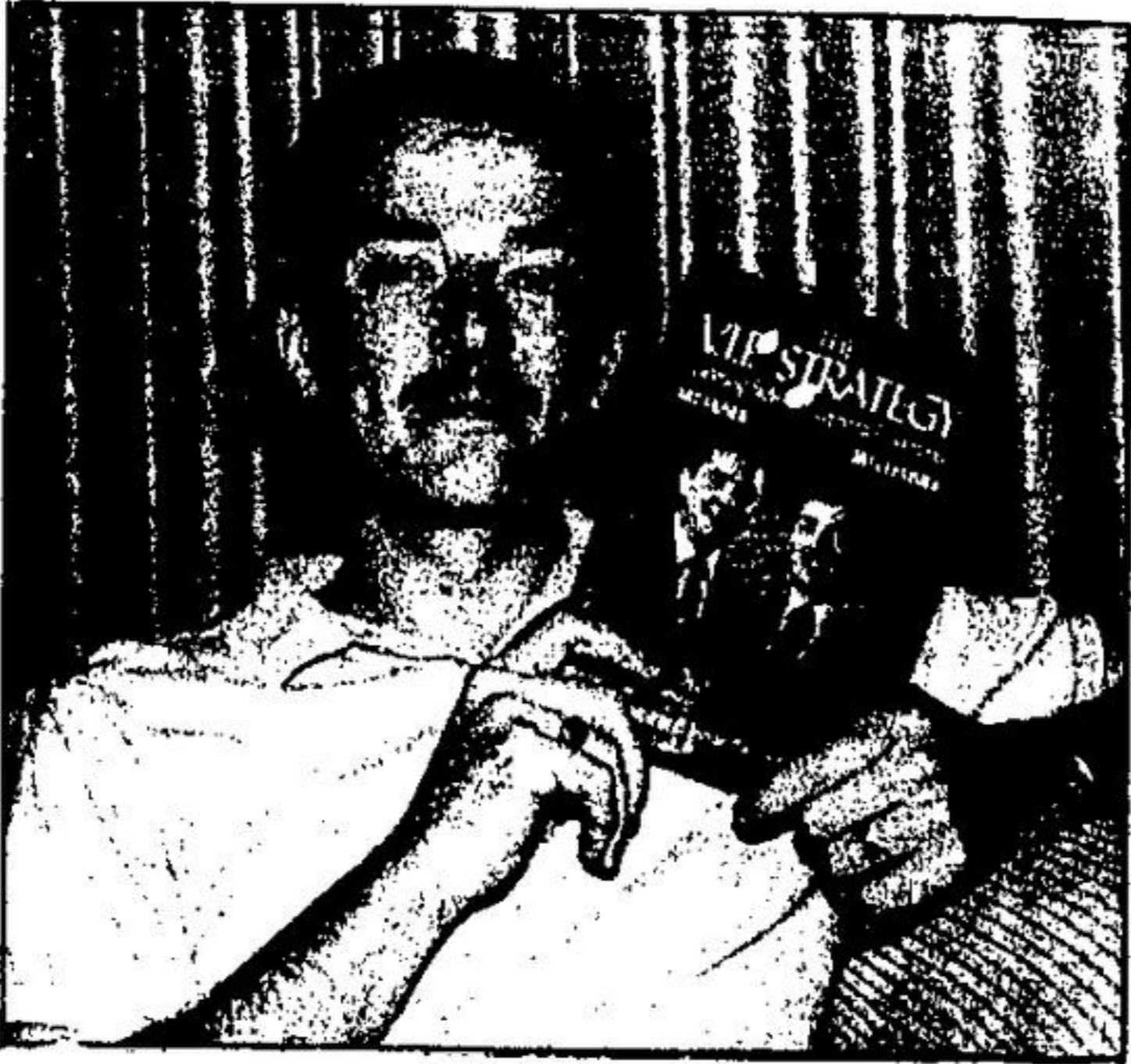
Enter *The V.I.P. Strategy*. The book, co-authored by Jim Clemmer and Art McNeil, brings together what other companies are doing effectively and provides a blueprint to help struggling companies find a direction.

Mr. Clemmer, a Georgetown resident, will be at the BIG Celebration in the Oxbow Books display, signing copies of his book, Saturday at 11 a.m., and Sunday at 2 p.m.

Suggestions and ideas dealt with in the book are based mainly on the work the pair have done with their own company.

In their company The Achieve Group Inc., Mr. Clemmer says, "we try and use the same strategies."

Mr. McNeil and Mr. Clemmer have been at both ends of the scale,

working as employees and as managers for ineffective companies.

Originating in Edmonton in 1978, The Achieve Group, which has become the Canadian leader in the field of leadership and organization effectiveness, has grown to seven offices spread throughout cities such as Halifax, Ottawa, Mississauga, and Edmonton, across the country.

Chapters in the book outline the most common problems faced in companies and lay out skills needed in leadership.

You learn the management side of business in school, Mr. Clemmer said. And most businesses keep abreast with technology, but the leadership area just gets lip service.

Managers often say the people are Number One. "They say all that stuff but it is not really happening," Mr. Clemmer said. Companies try to be experts in technology but they are not paying attention to people.

"More managers are learning that employees are not prepared to be a pair of hired hands," the author said. "They want involvement, participation and to be treated with respect."

Many managers just see employees as "assets wrapped in skin," he said.

The crunch comes in the area of customer service.

Today's customers expect to be treated with respect and expect a lot more, Mr. Clemmer said. You can get employees to do the job, but to get an employee to be enthusiastic and do more than his job, you have to treat him with respect.

The VIP Strategy has chapters dealing with topics such as problem solving and how to listen and deal with the problem at hand rather than raising the defences of the other person or personally attacking them.

There is also a section dealing
