Province throwing roadblocks into urban growth - Halton

Finding enough water to allow urban growth in Georgetown is proving to be more complicated than Halton Region had imagined.

One government ministry says Georgetown's planned expansion may have a serious impact on the capacity of Silver Creek to handle effluent from the expanded sewage treatment plant and the other says expansion may interfere with sport fishing and the introduction of salmon into the Credit River.

A letter from Benson Leung of the MOE said both ministries have "major concerns" about plans to draw water from one of three wells earmarked for use for expansion of Georgetown South (Halton Hills Village).

The MOE thinks there may not be enough water in the Georgetown area to assimilate the effluent from the sewage treatment plant.

But George Woodburn, operations Engineer for Halton Region, said

there is definitely enough water, it's just a matter of finding it.

Halton will also be looking for water near Speyside and near the Niagara Escarpment, said Mr. Woodburn. Georgetown needs an extra two million gallons a day and test drilling has already turned up about 1.2 million, he said.

Even if more water can't be found, Halton owns the rights to an abandoned well in Huttonville in Peel Region which could pump about 1 million gallons a day, he said.

But that well is quite remote and it will only be used as an "insurance policy," he said.

There is enough water in the current supply to allow Enterac Corporation to build 500 houses (Phase 1), said Mr. Woodburn.

Meanwhile, Regional councillors are angry with the MNR for "throwing fish into the equation."

Public Works Commissioner

Robert Moore said urban growth has already been planned and money has already been spent on expanding Georgetown's boundaries.

Halton wants the MNR to amend its fisheries management plan to take those altered boundaries into account.

If the government increases the water standards in the Credit River growth might be affected, said Mr. Moore.

"If they introduce additional specimens of fish (into the Credit River) they could jack up the criteria (of water standards) beyond what we could meet," he said.

"I don't believe we can make the (sewage treatment) plant any better than we've already done."

Coun. Pam Sheldon thinks the MNR's concerns are not legitimate.

She thinks the ministry's position was established by "a junior staffer with a biology degree."

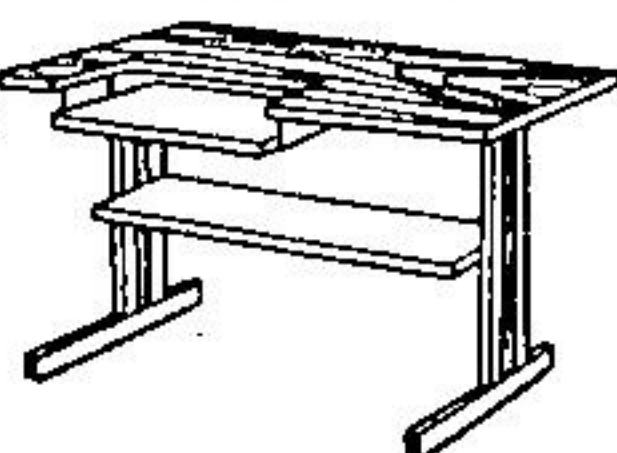

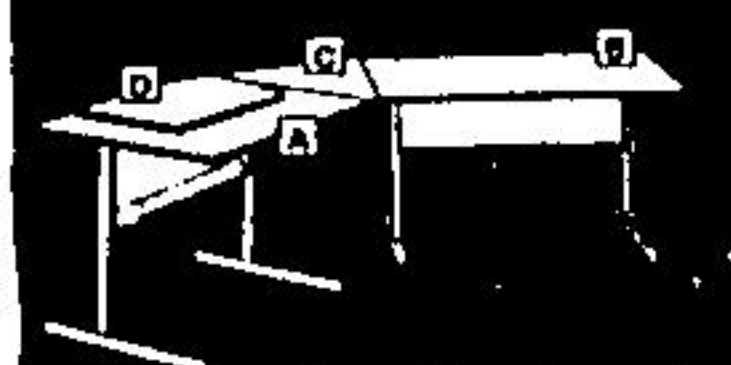

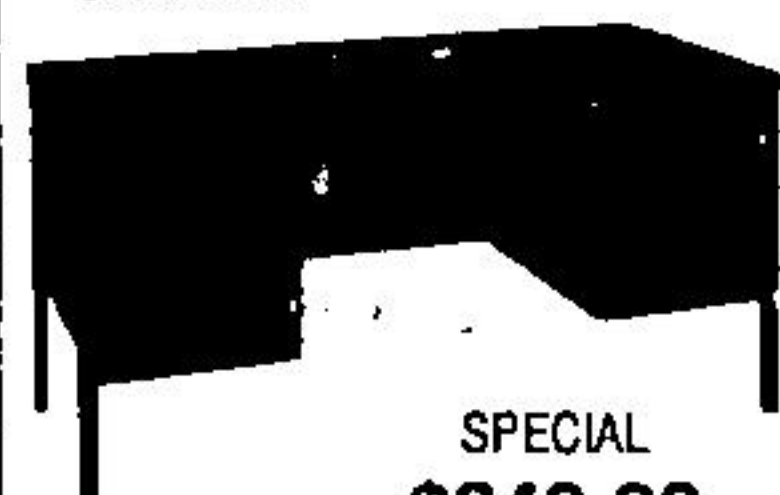
